Dear Parents,

After last week's letter about hawks, trees, salmon and wolves, a number of you were kind enough to say how much the 'Be More' reflection had resonated. I am glad it struck a chord, particularly given that the letter started with something I nearly deleted. I am going to squeeze another letter out of this with a fifth addition to the list: Be More Mountain Goat.



This week, I was in Stratford upon Avon at the Society of Heads training for new headteachers. It was a thoughtful and energising few days, with input from David Woodgate, the CEO of the Independent Schools Bursars Association, Julie Robinson, the CEO of the Independent Schools Council, and my personal favourite, the founder of Octopus Energy, whose reflections on leadership were surprisingly relevant to our sector.

In David's talk, he put up a slide I had seen before, one I shared with colleagues at my first INSET with them in January. In the sector, there is a bit of informal shorthand. Some schools are described as lions, some of the larger groups of schools are described as sharks, but there is a name for schools like ours – we are called Mountain Goats.

There is something quietly powerful about that. Not glamorous, not headline grabbing, but sure footed and steady. It says something not just about how schools like Saint Christina's operate, but about why they matter. In a sector with louder voices and deeper pockets, Mountain Goat schools are the ones that keep climbing, that stay rooted in their purpose. They fiercely protect their charitable status, answer to Governors and Trustees not shareholders, and they are led by mission, not margins. It is a term that deserves to be claimed and worn with pride.

It also feels timely. The Independent Sector is navigating a period of profound challenge. Political pressure, shifting expectations, changing demographics, a falling birth rate, and wider financial realities mean all schools are having to think carefully and act wisely. Just today, the High Court handed down its verdict on the case concerning VAT on school fees. The sector lost. If you are interested, you can read the full judgment here.
Against this backdrop, what stood out most for me this week was a simple truth: the schools that hold steady are the ones that know who they are.

Saint Christina's is proudly one of them. Our independence, our genuine independence, has never mattered more. To be truly independent is not just to stand apart from the crowd but to stand **for** something. For us, it means putting children firmly at the centre of every decision. It means investing in people and culture. It means building a school where our values are not simply words on a wall but ideals to be lived out. It means educating the whole child and nurturing potential rather than preselecting it.



Here is the thing: depth over display takes time, takes honesty, and takes trust; from us, from you, and from the children we serve. When that trust is there, something extraordinary happens: children grow confident, feel safe enough to take risks, brave enough to ask questions, and grounded enough to be themselves. That is what we want for every child here. That is what makes this School what it is.

That Saint Christina's Spirit spirit came to life for me again this week through our Year 6 legacy project. It is basically a mini MBA, designed to grow skills like creativity, communication, critical thinking and entrepreneurship, but more than that, it asks the children to think about the footprint they want to leave behind. After much discussion, they decided, entirely of their own accord, to donate the money they raised through their own products to help fund the refurbishment of our School Library. That is the legacy they collectively chose to leave; a gift to the whole School, to future pupils they will never meet. It brought a smile (and I will admit, maybe a tear or two) to my face, and I suspect it might to yours too. It tells us something about the kind of children we are growing here. Thoughtful. Kind. Big hearted. Rooted in values. *That* is the Saint Christina's difference.



The latter part of the week brought me home; starting the races at Sports Day, stepping into classrooms, and seeing again the calm energy and quiet brilliance of my colleagues and the children. That is what matters. That is our culture. That is our strength.

So, if last week was Be More Tree, Be More Salmon, Be More Wolf, and Be More Hawk, then this week, perhaps, it is this: Be More Mountain Goat, and Be More Saint Christina's.

Have a good weekend when it comes.

Reception's Fairy Tale Castle Workshop

Reception had a truly magical day on Friday when they took part in a Fairy Tale Workshop hosted by the enchanting storyteller named John. KS1 Story Club

Year 1

This week in Year 1, we've been busy becoming confident problem-solvers, thoughtful researchers, and creative storytellers!

In Maths, we've been exploring addition and subtraction, learning how they are connected through fact families. We used number bonds to help us write four related number sentences for each set of numbers. This helped us understand how knowing one fact can help us solve others.



In English and Science, we used iPads to research animals with our partners. We looked into their diets, habitats, and interesting behaviours, then created colourful and informative animal fact files to share with the class. We loved adding in our own fun facts!

In RE, we reflected on two important Bible stories: Jesus healing the paralysed man and Jesus calming the storm. These stories helped us think about kindness, faith, and staying calm even when things feel a bit stormy.

Year 2

This week in English, Year 2 have been delving deeper into vocabulary and language choices using Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by Roald Dahl. Focusing on Chapter 15, the children explored how Dahl uses groups of similar words, or synonyms, to build excitement and drama.

They began by matching synonym pairs and discussing how these words can often be used in similar, but not identical, ways. Using this as inspiration, they investigated powerful words from the story such as terrified and revolting, building their own synonym chains with the help of thesauruses.

Each child then used their vocabulary to write descriptive paragraphs about the Oompa-Loompas' life before arriving at the Chocolate Factory, highlighting just how grim their days were before Willy Wonka rescued them! The children worked very hard to vary their word choices and show how language can bring writing to life.


Fr Terry's Food Bank
