

Bulletin Friday 17th January 2025

Dear Parents,

I remember reading a study some years ago suggesting that alongside 1500-3000 decisions, the average teacher asks around 400 questions a day. For a Philosophy teacher, I'm going to hazard a completely unscientific guess and posit that this number might be even higher: then again, I would say that, but I think my Year 5 and 6 classes would probably agree! Yet over the past two weeks, I have been reflecting on my sticky question, which has been living rent-free in my head. It is simply this: **What is our community's "why"?**

If you haven't already done so, I invite you to take a look at the <u>Headteacher's Welcome</u> on the website, where I have endeavoured to articulate who we are as a school, which of course comes with a disclaimer: who we are as individuals and as a collective is not fixed, and I've only been here for 10 days. A School community is always growing, adapting, and evolving; there are external forces at work that will decide elements of that evolution for us, not least of all the Industrial Revolution of our times, AI. Over the past fortnight, I've been speaking a lot about potential with my colleagues and the children; there are chapters of Saint Christina's story that are yet to be written.

This week has provided plenty of opportunities to see that potential in action. For example, the return of our extracurricular clubs has been a joy to witness. It has been wonderful to see a new club added to our offering, 'Make and Create' as well as the return of the much-loved Drama and Film clubs with Mr. Duncan. These clubs are so much more than activities, they are opportunities for children to explore interests, build confidence, and develop important life skills like teamwork, perseverance, and creativity. They reflect our commitment to a well-rounded education that nurtures the whole child while maintaining academic ambition and rigour. It was also lovely to have the opportunity to meet with many of the Nursery and Reception parents this week and I look forward to meeting more of you in the weeks to come.

The importance of unlocking potential humbled me a few times this week. I've been struck by the initiative our children have shown when their curiosity has been sparked, and I want to share three examples from across the School with you. One pupil created a stunning poster exploring different branches of Philosophy after a weekend of independent research. Another designed a presentation about creating a friendship circle to promote kindness, a core value for us all. Finally, a pupil came to me with a heartfelt prayer (included in this newsletter) inspired by our Golden Thread of kindness. These moments remind us how much can be achieved when we give children the freedom to take ownership of their learning and explore their passions, and most importantly for me - when we take them seriously.

This reflection has also made me, and my colleagues, think about our community's purpose and direction. What defines Saint Christina's? What sets us apart? I've been reflecting on some important questions:

- How are our children learning?
- How do we prepare them for the next stage of their academic and personal journey?
- Are the skills they are developing encouraging them to take greater ownership of their learning?
- How are we cultivating character, resilience, and creativity, while driving a culture of academic excellence and high aspiration?
- How do we inspire deep thinking, unlock meaningful insights, and ensure children develop a strong sense of self?

These questions will guide our next steps as we revisit and refine our "why." To help shape this process, an external partner joined Sister Eileen on a learning walk this week. She was genuinely impressed by the soul of the School and the enthusiasm of our pupils. She emailed me to say "All the children I met were wonderful. They are clearly proud of their school, love being there, and value kindness. Your colleagues are completely invested in the children they teach and there is a sense of optimism throughout the school". We have secured her services over the coming year to act as a critical friend to Saint Christina's, bringing fresh eyes and perspective as we shape a clear vision for the next chapter.

The information we are gathering, from all corners of the community will feed into our **transition plan**, which will set out strategic objectives for Saint Christina's as we approach 2030. Some objectives will focus on immediate priorities, while others will lay the foundation for our long-term vision. At the heart of this plan is our shared commitment to teaching and learning, character formation, and co-creating a School community where curiosity, resilience, and ambition thrive.

This community is rich with eager and curious children, with parents who have approached me to kindly offer their wisdom and expertise (they may regret offering!), invested colleagues who go above and beyond out of a deep and genuine love for your children, and the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart, our Sisters next door who keep us grounded in their vision. Together, these elements form the beating heart of Saint Christina's and ensure that we remain true to our mission.

Finally, I've been inspired by the discussions around our sticky questions this week. These conversations aren't just about the answers the children provide but the thought processes and reasoning behind them. If you have time, do ask your child about this week's sticky question: it's always enlightening to hear their perspective.


Thank you for your continued support and for being an integral part of this extraordinary community. Together, we can ensure that our "why" continues to evolve in meaningful and progressive ways.

Geography in Year 2

This week in Year 2 we began exploring the United Kingdom, learning about its four countries and their capital cities. The children used maps to label England, Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland, as well as their capitals—London, Edinburgh, Cardiff, and Belfast. They practiced using compass directions to describe the locations of the countries and capitals, such as "Scotland is north of England."

To deepen their understanding, we discussed the challenge question: "Why do you think the UK has four different countries instead of just one?" The children shared some brilliant ideas about history, traditions, and geography, showing great curiosity and critical thinking. It's been a wonderful start to this topic, with plenty more to come!





Year 3

Year 3 have had another wonderful week at School. We have been writing some very vivid descriptions of a forest setting for the stories we are writing, which is based on the traditional/folk tale of Little Red Riding Hood. A sample of which you can read below:

Merrily, Little Red Riding Hood sauntered off through the misty, emerald green forest. She could see her watery reflection in the puddles on the path. (Advait)



In Maths, we have been busy learning how to tell the time to the nearest minute on analogue clocks, including ones with Roman numerals.

Year 6




I was impressed by the responses to our Curious Question this week: "If you could live in any time period, past or future, where would you live and why?" The children thought critically and justified their reasoning beautifully. Some created posters, while others wrote reflective pieces, sparking a brilliant class discussion. Opinions were divided, with some preferring the past and others advocating for the future, each offering thoughtful arguments for their choice.

We were also very fortunate to welcome Ms Chand, a highly experienced educator who has worked with Mr Walshe in previous schools. With over 20 years of expertise in preparing children for the 11+ in London, she delivered an invaluable workshop for the class. The session provided practical tips and reminders to help the children excel in their interviews. It was both engaging and incredibly useful.

Once again, the F1 in Schools project session was enjoyed by all! The children are brimming with excitement and would happily work on it every day if they could. It has been wonderful to see the teams collaborating to design their cars and create their logos. In PSHE, we've been discussing digital money, its value, and the importance of online safety. Meanwhile, in Geography, Year 6 has begun exploring North America. They children have been completing map work and learning about the states, landmarks, and their human, physical, and cultural features. Some children are even working on independent projects, researching a chosen state's economy, history, wildlife, and more.

It has been a week full of learning, creativity, and discovery!




Fr Terry's Food Bank

NUT FREE SCHOOL

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into School with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g., Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPens. Children should not be sent into School with any other type of medication e.g., Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.
