Dear Parents,

This week saw the annual and much-anticipated International & Heritage Week, and what a wonderful week it has been! I had the privilege of observing some excellent oracy, the culmination of some impressive research skills, as children shared elements of their cultures and backgrounds with pride and confidence. One of the things I love most about Saint Christina's is the richness of its diversity and the unity that flows from it. Watching the children celebrate their heritage while appreciating and embracing those of their classmates brought to mind the words of Michael Novak, the American philosopher and theologian: "Unity in diversity is the highest possible attainment of a civilization, a testimony to the most noble possibilities of the human race." Our children embody this beautifully, showing us how much the wider world could learn from their example. In class, the children have also been doing a deep dive into different countries – more about each class's focus will follow in this bulletin. It has been such an enriching week.

This theme of unity and hope is something we will reflect on in next week's Mass. Pope Francis has encouraged us to be *pilgrims of hope* - people who look to the future with courage, faith, and love. These reflections align perfectly with our ongoing discussions about values. At Saint Christina's, we are inspired by the *Fruits of the Spirit*: kindness, humility, forgiveness, and service, among others, but we are also asking what these values mean in a 21st-century context and most importantly, to our children.

How do we nurture resilience, leadership, and courage? What does it mean to live with compassion, justice, and gratitude in a world where we are told they are in deficit? These are the qualities we hope to instill in our children, equipping them not just for academic success but for lives of purpose and integrity. These conversations are at the heart of shaping who we are as a school community.

Looking ahead, next week is *Teaching Week*, a fantastic opportunity for colleagues to observe each other's lessons and celebrate the art of teaching. Teaching is a deeply personal and human endeavour, where each teacher brings their own style and personality to the classroom. It's not just about delivering knowledge but about sharing something of themselves. This week serves as a reminder of the richness within our teaching community and how much we can learn from one another.

Finally, a heartfelt thank you to those of you who have completed the parent questionnaires. Your feedback has been invaluable in helping us reflect on what we do and how we can continue to grow. If you haven't yet had the chance, there's still time to share your thoughts.





Mathematics at Lunchtime:

Now that all of the clubs have resumed, the Mathematics at lunchtime sessions have also started again!

This week I am going to focus on a simple problem that some of Year 3 were trying out with money:

If I have one each of all of the coins in circulation in the UK (i.e. 1p, 2p, 5p, 10p, 20p, 50p, £1, £2) and can use as many coins as I want

- (a) What is the biggest sum of money I can make?
- (b) What are some of the different sums of money I can make?
- (c) What are the smallest amounts of money that I CANNOT make?

Several of the children in Year 3 were able to work out what the smallest sum of money it is not possible to make was; but can you?

And can you, like others in Year 3, work out some of the other impossible amounts and then see a pattern in the answers that you get?

What was so encouraging about how Year 3 set about this problem was to see how methodically many of them were working.

NB: One member of Year Three was wondering how many possible different sums of money it was possible to make...can you find a way?

Children should not be sent into School with any other type of medication e.g., Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.
