Dear Parents.

"The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go." - Dr Seuss

Having found out this morning that I am instructed to dress up for World Book Day next week (I have no idea what to wear), it got me thinking about some of the books I read as a child. I have particularly vivid memories of sitting cross-legged on the floor in a pair of spiderman pyjamas, peanut butter on toast in hand, completely lost in *The Enchanted Wood* by Enid Blyton. It was the book I read and re-read more times than I can count. I was completely transported, and climbed the Faraway Tree, discovering strange and wonderful lands at the top, imagining what it would be like to live in a world where anything was possible.

The late great educationalist, Sir Ken Robinson often spoke with immense passion about how creativity is just as important as literacy, and reading is the natural gateway to both. Books don't just improve vocabulary or comprehension; they open doors to new ideas, ignite that spark of curiosity, and encourage children to think in different ways. A child who reads widely builds not only knowledge but also the ability to dream, invent, and create.

The benefits of reading are well documented. Ample research consistently shows a strong link between reading for pleasure and academic success. A study by the OECD found that children who develop a love of reading perform better in literacy, numeracy, and even problem-solving, regardless of their background. The National Literacy Trust also highlights that reading for enjoyment improves vocabulary, comprehension, and critical thinking skills, all of which are key foundations for lifelong learning.

Next week's **Book Fair** is an opportunity for children to discover books that might become their own *Faraway Tree*, opening new worlds and inspiring lifelong passions. Whether it's an adventure story that sparks their imagination, a mystery that gets them thinking, or a non-fiction book that ignites a new interest, the joy of reading is one of the greatest gifts we can give our children.

#### **Library Refurbishment Update**

In related news I am pleased to share some updates on our progress with the library refurbishment. Over the past few weeks, I've met with Parents Link, who have been leading discussions with colleagues, including our librarians and teachers. Our Library Prefects, along with the Head Girl and Head Boy, have been gathering feedback from pupils on the kinds of books they want to see in a library fit for the 21st century. All of this will be presented to the Governors at the next Full Governing Body meeting as we shape the next steps.

A huge thank you for the generosity that is making this project possible. The library is such an important space in our school. It is not just a place to find books, but somewhere for children to explore ideas, research, reflect, and unwind. We want to create an environment that sparks curiosity, encourages creativity, and nurtures a love of reading. As we move forward with this project, our aim is to ensure that every child finds something in the library

that inspires them, whether it's discovering a new author, diving into a research topic, or simply enjoying a quiet moment with a good book. I look forward to sharing more updates on the library as things progress.

Finally, I know the 11+ process can sometimes feel a little mysterious, so it was fantastic to see so many parents at our recent Information Evening. A huge thank you to everyone who attended and to our expert panel from Francis Holland, Wetherby Senior, and Wetherby Pembridge for their invaluable insights. I hope attendees found the discussion helpful as you navigate the next steps. Our 11+ booklet has been emailed to parents of children in Years 3 to 5, but if you'd like a hard copy, just let the office know. We await further offers on our current 11+ cohort and once all offers are finalised, Mrs Ellisdon, Mr Hirst and I cannot wait to share the news with you!






Well done Year 5, for your fantastic efforts in bringing literature to life!

## **National Mathematics Challenges**

Two of the National Mathematics Challenges in which children from Saint Christina's have participated are the Primary Mathematics Challenge and the Intermediate Mathematics Challenge.

#### The Primary Mathematics Challenge

Forty-nine children participated in this challenge back in November. Three of the children did so well in this challenge that they were invited to participate in the National Primary Mathematics Bonus Round, which took place in late January, earlier on this term. We have just received the results electronically, and are delighted that Hugo and Seb were both awarded Silver, in addition to Edda being awarded Bronze. Congratulations go to these children for performing so well and for representing Saint Christina's in such a good way. Their performance places them within the top 1, 500 children in this country at primary school level.

#### The Intermediate Mathematics Challenge

This challenge is an interesting challenge with plenty of unusually demanding problems. Although it is prinicipally aimed at children in Key Stage Four, we have always had some or all of the children in Year Six trying their hands at the challenge. To gain an award here means that a child will have to have performed within the top 50% of all participants in a competition dominated by children aged between 14 to 16 years old. We have always had one or more child gaining awards, but this year we had three children gaining Bronze awards, which is only the third time that we have had so many children getting awards since we started participating in this challenge in January 2017. Due to an administrative snarl up, we were unable to receive official awards this year, but we are delighted to say that Seb, Juliana and Edda all attained scores resulting in Bronze awards. This bodes really well for their mathematical futures, and congratulations go to them for bring honour to the school!

PS: The Junior Mathematics Challenge and The First Mathematics Challenge are due to take place next term, so we look forward to seeing how well our children will fare in these competitions...

# **Catholic Social Teaching at Saint Christina's**

Catholic Social Teaching is an expression of the Catholic faith, which touches on many aspects of life. Writings by Popes and Catholic leaders show how the Catholic faith can guide our response to different issues.

There are 7 principles of Catholic Social Teaching, we are called to uphold them.

- Sharing God's world, protecting the poor How do pupils share at home and at school? What are the kinds of things that are shared? Should everyone get exactly the same? Should some people get more? Why? For example, families with more children might need more resources, or someone with a disability might need extra help.
- Human Dignity 'What makes me special?' 'What makes people special? 'How should we treat each other?'

- Caring for Creation How do I show respect for Creation? The earth and all life on it are part of God's creation. We are called to respect this gift. We are responsible for taking care of the world we live in and for sharing all the wonders and resources the earth gives us.
- The Common Good What is 'true community'? The common good is reached when we work together to improve the wellbeing of people in our society and the wider world.
- **Solidarity** Who are our leaders? How do we stand with others? How did Jesus show service and justice?
- Family, community and participation This means all
  people have the right to participate in society and to seek
  the common good, which means the good for all.



• **Dignity in work** - All people work in some way because work is more than making a living, it's participating. Therefore, jobs and pay should be fair for everyone.

We will be looking at each of these principles throughout the academic year. The principle we will be focussing on this half term is Community and Participation.

As human beings, we are called to live in community, with others, growing together and flourishing as a result. We are called to be active members of society, our local and global community. Observing the reality of the world, remembering that first guideline of the dignity of all people, supporting one another and recognising how our gifts and talents could be used to the advantage of the wider community. We can't just sit back and bemoan what's happening, whether in our own parish and community, society, or the world. We are called to get our hands dirty, to get involved, to help build a better world. We're all called to put love into action. These lessons help children to understand the role we all must play in creating a fair society and strong communities.
