Dear Parents,

As we come to the end of term, I want to thank you for the many ways you have supported the School, my colleagues and me personally over these past months. I am also indebted to our community of Sisters next door for their continued guidance and generosity of spirit. It has been a rich term, with plenty to celebrate, and lots to reflect on. From the children's achievements in lessons to the way they have thrown themselves into performances, sports, trips and daily school life, our comprehensive teaching and learning review, all culminating in a very timely inspection from ISI where we got to showcase the very best of who we are. From this point on and for the next six weeks or so there are a series of processes to go through and therefore I am not in a position to provide any further details on the final outcome just yet, but you will be the first to know when I can share information with you.

January feels like a lifetime ago but this term I have been struck time and again by the way the children rise to meet the opportunities placed before them. Whether in the classroom, on the stage, the sports field or in quiet acts of kindness, they remind us daily of what really matters. Everything we do is in service of them and it is both a joy and a privilege to walk alongside them in these formative years. One moment that particularly stood out this week was the Year 6 Passion Play. It was an excellent and moving retelling of the Easter Story, performed with such sincerity, understanding and care. Their work brought home the heart of this season: sorrow and sacrifice, yes, but also the hope and promise that Easter holds.

About 25 years ago I was introduced to the theologian Marcus Borg and have devoured everything he has written ever since. His reflections on Easter are ones that make the most sense to me because of their simplicity. He described the resurrection as God's *'yes'* to Jesus. I like the simple notion of this idea because what I think he meant by this was that Easter is God's way of affirming or saying 'yes' to all that Jesus stood for in his life and ministry - compassion, justice, forgiveness and love. The Easter Story is an assurance that, in the end, these things are not defeated by pain, failure or even death. For us as a School community, that message speaks powerfully into our shared life. It reminds us that the values we strive to encourage in our children - kindness, courage, empathy and truth are not only worthwhile but also have the power to be transformative. Whatever our belief, background or story in this diverse community, the Easter message is a timeless one and I believe that it transcends religious boundaries because it invites us to live with greater courage, deeper compassion and a renewed sense of hope - not in perfection, but in the possibility of growth and new beginnings.

At Saint Christina's I am constantly reminded of how fortunate we are to work with such thoughtful, curious and generous-hearted children. I am also incredibly grateful to my colleagues for the care and commitment they bring every day. It is their work, much of it unseen, that allows the School to flourish in the way that it does. In helping children grow, we also must remember that they are still 'becoming'. Sometimes we place adult brains on our young people and expect responses that do not yet match their age or stage, and this is a mistake. Children are not mini grown-ups. They are still learning, still forming. None of us are the finished article and the work of a school is not about demanding perfection, but about creating the space to grow, to make mistakes, to reflect and to begin again. Context matters. So does patience, and for me, this is where our values should take centre stage. None of us has a monopoly on truth, nor do we always get everything right, but our values give us something to reach for. They help shape our choices, especially when things feel uncertain or difficult.

This too is part of the Easter message because it is a reminder that renewal is always possible. God's 'yes' to Jesus is also a 'yes' to the way of love and forgiveness, even when it is hard. That message speaks directly into the work of any School and any community. We fall short, we begin again, and we try to walk more closely in the light of what we believe to be good and true.

This term has also been one of transition and quiet determination for our Year 6 children, with our boys making history by becoming our first 11 plus cohort. Collectively, Year 6 gained offers to a list of impressive and highly selective senior schools. Their outcomes were excellent, and they achieved them without fuss or drama: quietly, confidently and together. We are incredibly proud of how they approached this time in their journey, not just for the academic results, but for the way they carried themselves along the way. It would also be remiss of me to not offer thanks to the countless colleagues who helped them on this journey. They all have my sincere gratitude and admiration because this was a team effort.

Looking ahead, we begin next term with training on metacognition and self-regulated learning, part of a two-year journey we are undertaking together. This work will support children to understand how they learn, how to reflect on their thinking and how to take increasing ownership of their growth. It will help us as teachers too, as we guide them not just to know more, but to think well and live wisely.

I hope the break gives you a moment to pause, to rest and to enjoy time together. Thank you again for your continued support. I look forward to seeing you in April for the start of the Summer Term.

Library Refurbishments

PL met the incoming Head on 21st January to discuss various items including the library. We met again on the 30th January to discuss the budget, the details of the proposals and the timeline for the library. Mr Walshe drew up a number of documents seeking detailed thoughts from the teachers on how they would like the room to be used. The feedback sought included how best to optimise children's learning, questions to consider, how best to promote literacy and learning, health and safety and other considerations.

Mr Walshe also sought suggestions for books to support children at every stage under 22 separate categories including but not limited to core curriculum support, Religious Education, Fantasy and Adventure, Neurodiversity and Inclusion, Emotional Wellbeing, STEM, Sports and Physical Education etc, etc.

In addition, the class teachers reached out to parents and the children throughout the school asking for suggestions of books they would like to see added to the library. Fr Rudolf and a member of PL have been working with the library prefects to draw up a list of books from every class. The list stands at over 100 books, but we hope to receive more suggestions from you all!

The feedback received directly impacted the proposed design. More specific zoning is required to enable quiet reading, group collaboration and relaxation i.e. creating spaces where children feel comfortable doing any of these things. Additional data points are needed as tablets, eBooks and interactive screens will be used in this room. The

incorporation of an interactive whiteboard will enable incoming authors to present their work, staff to hold staff meetings and give teachers an additional tool to work with.

This reinforces the feedback received from the teachers responsible for running the library in November last year. They highlighted the need for nooks/cosy spots for independent learning and reading, swapping the display shelves in the EYFS area to enable little people to access the books more easily and reducing the number of desks in the study area to create more flexibility.

We met again on the 13th February to discuss all of the above. We agreed not to make any amendments to the design until we had secured Board approval. We continued to seek feedback while doing additional research in how to support SEN in the learning environment. A presentation was made to the Board of Governors on behalf of Parents' Link on the 12th March and they gave us full approval to proceed.

We met the Site Manager Steve on the 18th March to secure his feedback re-maintenance issues of the proposed works and how best to future proof the lighting and electrical layout. A reflected ceiling plan was issued to the School for comment 20th March. Steve, a member of PL and the School's electrician met Thursday 27th March to discuss the proposed layout. Some small amendments have been made, and they will be incorporated into the latest drawing. The drawings have also been issued to the schools IT support to secure their input. It is important to finalise the electrical and lighting layout before we install any joinery as we want the cost and potential damage of fitting new points after installation.

The ceiling lighting was updated last year. It is quite a sophisticated system that automatically turns on/off depending on the existing light in the room so there are no plans to amend it. We have added lights to the reading nooks though.


Ms Geary gave detailed feedback on the proposed materials and colours for the library to ensure that we create an environment that is hospitable and comfortable for all children including those with additional needs. The material choices have changed as a result of her advice, and we will present a new selection of materials at quiz night. Ms Geary has also supported the addition of smaller spaces that children can retreat to within the larger space.

The amended designs attached show the creation of four distinct zones i.e.. EYFS, a breakout area in front of the whiteboard, a study/homework club area and the librarian's area. Three small reading nooks have been created in the shelving and a floor to ceiling bookcase has been added between the EYFS and librarian's zone. The creation of more seating gives us the opportunity to use softer colour whilst also reducing ambient noise as the upholstery will absorb ambient sound. This will create a calmer space for all and be particularly helpful for our neurodiverse children.

The designs were finalised last week. They were issued to last year's winning contractor on the 24th March but unfortunately, he is no longer available to complete the work. We have agreed to complete this project as a phased development as we are all keen to get started asap. We approached ten builders to tender for the works last summer. After extensive and protracted hassling of same, two contractors priced for the works. We will now need to start the tender process again. If anyone has any contractors that they could recommend we would really like to hear from you.

We have raised approximately £16,000 so far. This is approximately half of the anticipated overall budget. We have allocated £14,000 to spend on the joinery in the first phase and reserved £1,000 for upholstery. We are hoping to spend about £1,000 on books. This will use up all the funds we have raised to date for the library, but we hope to deliver as much of the project as we can before we attempt the next phase of fundraising!

Thank you for your patience and generosity with this project. It simply would not be possible without your support and thank you for bearing with us while it all slowly comes together!

Year 6

On Wednesday, Year 6 had the privilege of welcoming a Transport for London (TfL) representative and a TfL Police Officer as part of their transition programme. This engaging session equipped the children with essential life skills for safe and independent travel.

The workshop covered journey planning, active travel, and responsible behaviour on public transport. The children learned about the ZIP card scheme, including its benefits, the application process, and the importance of meeting behaviour expectations. They also explored key safety practices, such as waiting



safely at bus stops and underground stations, using escalators correctly, and understanding the dangers of underground tracks.

Beyond practical safety, the session encouraged thought-provoking discussions on respect, citizenship, and making responsible choices when faced with peer pressure, uncomfortable situations, or suspicious packages. The children also learned about the impact of vandalism and the legal consequences of breaking the law, including how criminal charges from as young as ten years old can have lasting effects on future opportunities.

This invaluable workshop helped the children develop the confidence to navigate the transport network independently, while reinforcing respect, responsibility, and good decision-making—skills that will benefit them as they transition to secondary school and beyond.
