Dear Parents,

The first week of a new school year always carries with it a special sense of anticipation. As a child, I always associated the end of the holidays and the start of September with a trip to Woolworths to buy a new pencil case (and to irritate my mum until she bought me some pick-n-mix). There is something about new stationery, the neatness of unused note books, and the feel of sharp pencils that all carry the excitement of new beginnings and possibilities. New books, classrooms and friendships all bring with them that same promise. I think what makes September so powerful is the sense of hope it stirs in us.

As a teacher, when I think of September I think about resolutions. I found out this week that the concept stretches as far back as the Babylonians who made them over 4,000 years ago, and of course the Romans made theirs to Janus, the god of beginnings. Across time people have used turning points in the calendar to set their intentions. Teachers are lucky in this regard because we get two chances each year: January and September. Both encourage us to pause, take stock, and decide where we want to focus our energy.

This September I have asked colleagues to think not only about what they want to achieve for themselves, but also about the intentions they hold for the children in our care, and I would like to extend that invitation to you, also. What hopes or intentions do you hold for your children this year? It might be as simple as trying something new, reading a little more widely, or showing kindness when it is not the easy choice. These small resolutions, shared between home and school, can help shape the habits and values that last well beyond the year.

We live in a world that increasingly feels weighed down by uncertainty and challenge, and a barrage of headlines remind us daily of difficult realities beyond our little oasis in St. John's Wood. Yet walking through school this week, teaching Philosophy lessons to Year 5 and 6, hearing laughter in the classrooms, watching children lean into their learning, and noticing the small acts of kindness that make Saint Christina's what it is, reminds me once again why education matters so deeply. Schools are places of optimism and hope, and just like new stationery, they remind us of what is possible.



At Saint Christina's, we begin this year with a clear sense of purpose. Our Approaching 2030 plan is about more than academic standards. It is about shaping character, developing knowledge and skills, and building a culture of thinking that prepares children for a complex world. If Aristotle was right; that if you have their hearts, you have their minds, then our task is to hold both together. We want to inspire intellectual growth while also nurturing the compassion and resilience that enable children to feel comfortable in their own skin and flourish.

In this bulletin, you will find letters from our newly installed Assistant Headteachers, Mr Burke and Mrs Ellisdon, who are sharing their pastoral and academic visions for the year ahead. I encourage you to take a moment to read them. Pastoral care and academic ambition are two sides of the same coin, and we want to ensure that every child is both supported and challenged, growing not only in their learning but also in the kind of person they are becoming.

So, as we begin again this September, I hope we can all take up the gift of resolutions. Not just private goals, but shared intentions that bind us together as a community. To help the children learn well, to encourage them when they stumble, and to remind them that they belong here. Saint Christina's is at its strongest when we remember that we are a community bound together by our Golden Thread and a shared purpose. That is what makes September more than a beginning. It is a reminder of what we can achieve together and together is always better.

Thank you, as always, for the trust you place in us. I look forward to walking alongside you and your children in the year ahead. To the children and families who are joining Saint Christina's for the first time, a warm welcome. We are so pleased you are with us, and I hope you will quickly come to feel part of the family. Saint Christina's is a very special community.

Assistant Head - Pastoral - Vision for 2025-26

Dear Parents,

As I step into this new year as Assistant Head (Pastoral), my vision is simple: to ensure that every child at Saint Christina's feels safe, supported, and known. For me, pastoral care and academic ambition are inseparable because children learn best when they feel they belong, when they are listened to, and when they are encouraged to become the best version of themselves.

This year, our pastoral provision will be rooted in tailored care and pupil voice. Weekly check-ins with teachers will make sure that every child is thought about individually, while our half-termly pupil voice surveys will give children a direct say in shaping school life. I want pupils to see that their ideas matter, with the School Council helping to analyse results and feed them back to the wider community.

Alongside this, we are building opportunities for children to decompress, connect, and play through our daily pastoral activities - from sensory circuits to nature breaks, music and movement, gardening, and the weekly Wellbeing Hub. The Hub, run with our Wellbeing and Inclusion Ambassadors, will continue to be a safe and welcoming space where children can find calm, creativity, and support from their peers.

The Catholic life of the school remains at the heart of what we do. Each half term we will explore a principle of Catholic Social Teaching, beginning with Care for Creation. Through the work of our Caritas Ambassadors and initiatives such as supporting Fr Terry's Food Bank, pupils will learn how Catholic Social Teaching is lived out through service, kindness, and making a difference to others.

Finally, I oversee PSHE across the school. This is about giving children the tools to build healthy relationships, manage feelings, and grow in confidence and resilience. It also links closely with our whole-school focus on the 6Cs: Communication, Collaboration, Critical Thinking, Curiosity, Creativity, and Commitment. Together, these values will help children to thrive not only in their learning but also in the kind of people they are becoming.

My hope for this year is that every child knows they are valued, every voice is heard, and every pupil has the chance to shine, both in their achievements and in the kindness and resilience they show to others.

Assistant Head - Academic - Vision for 2025 - 26

Dear Parents,

As I begin this year in my role as Assistant Head (Academic), my vision is to ensure that every child at Saint Christina's is challenged, inspired, and supported to achieve their very best. Our aim is not only to nurture academic excellence but also to equip the children with the skills, curiosity, and confidence they need to thrive in a changing world.

This year, our academic focus will be shaped by the whole-school 6Cs: Communication, Collaboration, Critical Thinking, Curiosity, Creativity, and Commitment. In particular, we will continue to develop the children's metacognitive skills, encouraging them to reflect on how they learn, and to take increasing ownership of their progress. By understanding their own thinking, children will be better prepared to set goals, overcome challenges, and unlock their full potential.

Across Key Stage 2, we have introduced STEM lessons into the timetable to embed opportunities for the children to apply their learning collaboratively to real-world and community challenges. This will help children to see the relevance of their learning beyond the classroom, building both problem-solving and teamwork skills. In addition, Philosophy for Children (P4C) will be introduced across the whole school, providing all children with the chance to ask big questions, reason together, and enrich their critical thinking.

New House Competitions will be introduced throughout the year; each designed to highlight and celebrate the 6Cs. These events will not only encourage collaboration and creativity but also build resilience, confidence, and pride in achievement.

Enrichment will also play a central role and will give the children opportunities to explore a range of new ideas and activities. Trips will connect to curriculum topics, deepening children's understanding by bringing learning to life.

The curriculum is designed to spark a love of learning and to prepare our children to be thoughtful, responsible, and compassionate global citizens. My hope for this year is that every child knows their efforts are valued and takes pride in their achievements and continues to build their confidence and ambition to make a difference in the world.

The 6Cs: Beginning the conversation with your children

You may start to see your children coming home with stickers showing one of our 6Cs. These are the six habits and skills that we want to weave through learning at Saint Christina's:

- Communication
- Collaboration
- Critical Thinking
- Curiosity
- Creativity
- Commitment

They are not add-ons to academic learning but the threads that help our children grow into confident learners and contributors to the world around them.

Communication

Being able to share ideas clearly and listen carefully to others.

Questions you might ask:

- "How did you explain that to me so clearly?"
- "Can you tell me your idea in another way?"
- "What did you mean when you said...?"

Ways you could praise:

- "You explained that really clearly. I understood straight away."
- "I like the way you looked at me when you were talking."
- "You listened carefully before answering.
 That showed great communication."

Collaboration

Working well with others so everyone has a voice and a role.

Questions you might ask:

- "How did you work together on that?"
- "What helped you to agree on the best idea?"
- "How did you make sure everyone had a turn?"

Ways you could praise:

- "I like the way you listened to each other."
- "You shared the jobs really fairly. That was great teamwork."
- "You helped when it got difficult. That made a difference."



Critical Thinking

Looking closely at information, spotting patterns, and making thoughtful decisions.

Questions you might ask:

- "What makes you think that?"
- "Is there another way you could solve this?"
- "What is the strongest reason for your answer?"

Ways you could praise:

- "You took time to check your answer instead of rushing."
- "I like how you explained your reasoning."
- "You spotted the problem before it happened. That showed careful thinking."

Curiosity

Asking questions and wanting to find out more about the world.

Questions you might ask:

- "What do you wonder about this?"
- "Why do you think it works that way?"
- "What would you like to find out next?"

Ways you could praise:

- "That was a brilliant question."
- "I like the way you wanted to dig deeper."
- "You did not stop at the obvious. You kept asking."

Creativity

Using imagination to come up with new ideas and fresh ways of doing things.

Questions you might ask:

- "What is another way you could do this?"
- "If there were no rules, what would you try?"
- "How could you make this even more interesting?"

Ways you could praise:

- "That was an original idea. I had not thought of it like that."
- "I love how you put those two things together."
- "You made something new out of what you already had. That shows creativity."

Commitment

Keeping going, even when things are challenging, and finishing what you start.

Questions you might ask:

- "What kept you going when it was hard?"
- "How did you feel when you finished it?"
- "What would you try again next time?"

Ways you could praise:

- "You did not give up even when it was tough. That is commitment."
- "I saw how much effort you put in, and it paid off."
- "You kept practising until it clicked. Well done."



A final word for parents

When your child comes home with a 6C sticker, you might want to ask them what they did to earn it and use one of the questions above to help them reflect. Praising their effort, persistence, and willingness to try new things reinforces the habits we are encouraging in school. My hope is that we can make these six habits part of daily life so that children grow in confidence and self-belief.

Sustainability and Eco at Saint Christina's

As part of my new role leading the sustainability strategy across the whole school, we are continuing to grow our focus on sustainability and care for the environment, building on the foundations we have already put in place. As part of this, we will once again be working towards the Eco-Schools Green Flag Award, which recognises schools that put environmental awareness and action at the centre of school life.

Our vision is that every class will take part in at least one eco-focused lesson each term, as well as one lesson outdoors that encourages children to appreciate and connect with nature in less obvious ways.

Key Stage 2 will be helping us launch this next stage: Year 3 and 4 are starting with a STEM recycling project, exploring how waste is managed at school, at home, and in the local area. They will share their findings and ideas with our soon-to-be-formed Eco Committee, which will meet in the first few weeks of term with the guidance of our new Eco Prefects, Raphael and Sara, in Year 6. Meanwhile, Year 5 and 6 will be taking responsibility for our green spaces, tending to our gardens and green walls, setting up composting systems, and monitoring food waste at lunchtimes.

We are also looking forward to building links with our local community, exploring opportunities to work with organisations such as London Zoo and other partners to enrich the children's learning and strengthen our impact.

This is only the start of the next chapter in our sustainability journey, and we are excited to see how the whole school can play its part in making a real difference.

- Drop-off & registers: Pupils must be in class by 9:00 am; morning register closes 9:15 am. If arriving after 8:55 am, please sign in at the foyer. Arrivals after 9:15 am may be recorded as an unauthorised late (U code) for the morning session. Doors open at 8:40 am for Years 4,5, and 6 and 8:45 am 8:50 am for KS1/EYFS.
- Reporting absence: Phone the Office by 8:45 am each day of illness and also email your class teacher and the Office; thank you.
- Planned absence: Request in advance via the Headteacher for exceptional circumstances; term-time holidays can't be authorised.
- When attendance drops: We'll work with families to help. Persistent absence is below 90%, and certain absences are shared with the local authority (e.g., 10 consecutive days; 15 days for illness under Code I).


For this competition, children are invited to design a heading and logo for each of the 6Cs. Using their imagination, Creativity, and artistic skills, children should:


- Design the lettering for one or more of the 6Cs in a creative and eye-catching way.


Wellbeing Hub & Pupil Ambassadors
