Dear Parents,

I'm writing this from the Catholic Independent Schools Conference in Oxford, where the theme this year has been *Hearts on Fire - Feet on the Move*. I like this theme because alongside the overt rallying cry it is also an invitation to dig a little deeper and reflect on our purpose and direction as educators. There was a quote by Frederick Buechner in one of the sessions that instantly brought my mind back home to NW8: "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." My gut feeling is that for most of us, the secret ingredient to human flourishing exists in that space, that intersection where joy and purpose come together.

Earlier this week I witnessed the manifestation of this idea in real time, and it all started on Monday morning with the following question: "If you rent a donkey, do you also rent its shadow?" A little context will probably help here! The Philosophy Man, who will be assisting us in the launch of our culture of thinking, came to deliver P4C sessions to the children and sparked some priceless conversations throughout the school, but the one that really made me laugh was delivered in a KS2 assembly about whether a donkey's shadow can be rented separately from the donkey itself. The story goes that a man hired a donkey for a journey across the desert. When the sun became too hot, he stopped to rest in its shade. But the owner protested, claiming that he had only rented out the donkey, and not its shadow. A dispute followed: should the man have to pay extra for the shade, or was it naturally included? The debate went in all sorts of directions - was the shadow part of the agreement, or an unexpected bonus? Should it come at an extra cost, or does its value depend on need? It was a brilliant example of what happens when children are given the space to think deeply, reason carefully, and listen to other perspectives. And they went really, really deep!

On Wednesday, a former colleague of mine, who now writes the computing curricula for the Raspberry Pi Foundation, visited us to talk about Coding, the place of AI in education, and more generally all things computing. We spoke about how schools prepare children for an increasingly digital world and how best to ensure that technology remains a tool to enhance learning, rather than an end in itself. This last point has been a common theme in my recent parent Coffee Mornings, alongside what constitutes an appropriate limit on screen time. Our newly installed Digital Strategy committee have started these discussions, and as we move forward in writing our strategic plan, we are committed to ensuring that our approach is measured and purposeful. Also, our visitor *loved* the school, remarked on how calm it was, was blown away by the exemplary behaviour of the children, and, like so many of us who step through these doors, remarked that she *felt the school* from the moment she walked in.

Philosophical questions like the donkey's shadow are a brilliant way to encourage children to dig deeper in their thinking. As we've been discussing in school for *Children's Mental Health Week*, thinking about our thoughts – why we believe what we do, how we see and talk to ourselves, and how we grow, can be just as important as answering a question itself. One of the best ways you can support this at home is by asking follow-up questions when your child shares their ideas. For this week's sticky question, try a few of this following:

- Can you tell me more?
- Can you say why?
- You said (repeat the answer), but I think...
- Can you give me an example?
- Why is that important?

These kinds of prompts help children develop the confidence to justify their reasoning, build on their ideas, and consider alternative perspectives. Whether it's a debate about a donkey's shadow, a question about fairness, or a discussion about AI in education, encouraging children to explain *why* they think something is true is a powerful way to deepen their understanding.


Children's Mental Health Week

This week we marked Children's Mental Health Week across the school, helping children reflect on their wellbeing and explore ways to support themselves and others.

We began with an engaging assembly from the School of Kindness (www.schoolofkindness.org), where children learned about what mental health is, why it matters, and how we can look after it. The assembly introduced this year's theme: Know Yourself, Grow Yourself, encouraging pupils to recognise their strengths, understand their emotions, and think about how they can develop new skills.

Throughout the week, children took part in class discussions, creative activities, and reflection





tasks. They shared moments when they felt proud of themselves, thought about what helps them to feel calm and supported, and identified the people who encourage them to grow.

Kindness was also a key focus - both kindness to others and to ourselves. Across the school, children explored small but meaningful ways to show kindness in their daily lives and how positive actions can have a big impact on others.

Year 2 P4C Workshop with Tom Biggleswade

This week, Year 2 took part in an exciting *Philosophy for Children* (P4C) workshop led by Tom Biggleswade. P4C encourages children to think deeply by exploring big questions through discussion and reasoning.

In our session, we were given a challenge—ordering different actions from least naughty to naughtiest. Should calling a teacher a bad name be seen as worse than accidentally leaving a banana skin on the floor? This sparked a thoughtful debate, where we listened to each other's ideas, explained our reasoning, and agreed or disagreed respectfully.

It was a fantastic opportunity for the children to develop their critical thinking, communication and teamwork skills.



Year 6

Year 6 had a fantastic time during their Philosophy workshop with Tom Bigglestone, who encouraged them to explore the power of questioning. They learned how simple prompts like "Tell me more?", "Why is it important?", and "What would change your mind?" can deepen discussions and challenge perspectives. They also tackled the challenge of expressing their views in just seven words, refining their ability to think clearly and concisely. Another highlight was ranking different scenarios on a 'naughty scale'—debating which actions were more mischievous and justifying their choices with thoughtful reasoning. The session was a brilliant opportunity for Year 6 to sharpen their critical thinking skills and engage in lively, meaningful discussions.

Year 6 have participated in the Linguistics Olympiad Competition, testing their skills in language and problem-solving. It was a fantastic opportunity for them to challenge themselves and engage with language in a fun, competitive setting. The competition introduced some fascinating languages, starting with **Devanagari**, one of the official languages of India. The second language was **Fur**, the language of the Fur people from Darfur in western Sudan. The third language was **Saisiyat**, spoken in the mountainous regions of northwest Taiwan. Some of the children then challenged themselves to explore **Icelandic** and **Armenian**, showcasing their determination to dive deeper into language learning!

Year 6 have also been reflecting on Children's Mental Health Week. They wrote some heartfelt and powerful poems in class, focusing on well-being, kindness, and emotional health, showing their thoughtful approach to this important initiative.

Primary Mathematics Challenge Bonus Round

Last November saw close on 50 of our children participating in the first round of the National Primary Mathematics Challenge. This is a competition which is now in its 25th year, and we have had children participate in the challenge pretty well every year.

This year, three of our children got through to the Bonus Round (which used to be referred to as the Finals Round!) and they sat the paper on Tuesday 4th February.

Our three children were Edda, Hugo and Seb.

We will not know their results for another few weeks, as the Mathematical Association of Great Britain has to wait for all of the results to be submitted, but we are hopeful that our results will be good this year!

If you are interested in what the problems were like this year, you will have to wait for two weeks until we can legitimately print some of them in our bulletin! This is because children have the opportunity to participate in the Bonus Round up until the end of the week, and copyright dictates that we do not publicise anything before then.

Intermediate Mathematics Challenge 2025

This year, Year 6 sat the paper for the Intermediate Mathematics Challenge in late January. Although many of the questions are beyond the reach of your average child in Key Stage Two, the class had a brave attempt at the paper.

I was impressed with the determination that they all showed, and there were certainly some members of the class whose performance will have put them on par with some much older children, including those in Years 9 to 11.

We will have to wait for a few weeks yet to see if any of our pupils will have gained any awards this year, as the UKMT does not publish results until all entries are sent in to them. However, we should be in a position to know more by early March, hopefully.

To whet your appetite, here are two of the questions that our children attempted this year:

Qu 4: All Felix's cats are normal cats. Together, they have 12 more legs than they have tails. In total, how many ears do they have?

Qu 24: Two white roses and a yellow rose costs £5. Two white roses and three red roses cost £10.50. Three yellow roses and two red roses cost £11. What would be the total cost of one red rose, one white rose and one yellow rose?
