Dear Parents,

As we wend our way to the end of another week in School, I cannot express how pleased I am with the way that the children and staff have settled into this new term. It cannot be denied that as we grow, and we are 15 or so children bigger than we have been in recent years, that we need to be mindful of our core values of Love, Dignity and Respect. It is very easy, when people are 'doing well' to forget that everything around them is new. So we have been reflecting on those core values in School and we hope that we can extend the invitation to embrace our Golden Thread beyond the School Day. New is good. New is refreshing and exciting. But new also means we have to make adjustments. A parent speaking to me recently said that they were very impressed with the School and we seemed to have it 'nailed'. It was as very generous comment, but my response to this sentiment is that where communities of people are concerned, nothing is ever nailed. Communities are organic and ever-changing. Each year, for example, a cohort leaves and a fresh intake arrives, and we start over. Teachers change and everyone brings a new perspective. Parents who have contributed so much in the past, move on too, and others come to take their place with different ways of doing things. I think a good metaphor for a School community is that we are like the Forth Bridge: when they finish painting it, they have to immediately start over again. And this is what is exciting about a community like ours because that's what brings it life - so essential to any School particularly in these very uncertain times! That life is the bedrock of the joy, excitement and sense of belonging in a living community. Your children are a credit to you all and we delight in having the privilege of your company within our community.

Our Golden Thread: We have spent a lot of time over the last few years thinking about 'community' and what that means to us. One of the words that the children have thought a lot about over the years, is 'dignity', and how we need to afford everyone dignity. In assemblies, we have considered communities that are like a tub of marbles and communities that are more like a bunch of grapes. We can all see the individual marbles and when we are all in the tub, the marbles are close together, but they are not connected, and if the tub is emptied, the marbles tend to scatter,

and many may be lost as they roll away from the epicentre of the tipping.

Not so with a bunch of grapes. Grapes are all held together by a common thread. If a grape is plucked from the bunch, there is a hole where the grape used to be. Grapes are juicy and can be bruised. They are soft and organic and can be enjoyed, and squashed. But they are all held together by a single organic thread and this thread connects to a greater branch and whole until, ultimately everything connects back to the root that feeds the vine.

We have thought a lot about the type of community that we are and want to be. We identify with the grapes. We are all connected by our common values of Love, Joy, Peace, Goodness, Kindness, Gentleness, Patience and Self-Control. We don't always get it right, but that is the community we seek to be and those are the characteristics we seek to cultivate as we grow.



We recognise that our community is made up of people from all around the world. We have a multitude of cultures, languages, faiths and ways of doing things represented within our community, but we are, nevertheless, one. Whilst we express our one-ness through the teachings of the Bible, the one-ness that we express transcends being a Catholic or Christian. *Our Golden Thread is that we love our neighbour – and our neighbour is not the person who lives next door, or our best buddy, but it is everyone*. And it's a tough love. How do you love the unlovely? Well we are asked to do so. So, we have reflected on what sort of community we are and want to continue to be.

We know we are setting the bar high, but we seek to be a community that keeps its roots in the cool waters of wisdom, that we as individuals become like a tree where all around us can thrive – we give, we love, we grow, we respect, we enable – and a community that seeks to take the tough road that is loving our neighbour as ourselves.

It was wonderful to be able to invite so many of our new parents into School on Thursday evening. Thank you for all your kind and supportive comments about our school and the warmth of our community. It means a great deal, and I do hope that you are all able to enjoy new friendships and opportunities as we all get to know each other.

And finally, I would like to thank Philippe for joining me as Headteacher for the Day today. We have had a fantastic morning and I have enjoyed having help in assembly and with my duties and been grateful for his contributions to our school strategy meeting. I am delighted that he has agreed to write for the bulletin this week to tell you a little more about his experience today.

This week, Year 2 looked ahead to World Gratitude Day which is celebrated on Saturday 21st September.


The children drew pictures and wrote down their ideas, showing appreciation for family, friends, school and nature.

Catholic Social Teaching at Saint Christina's

Catholic Social Teaching is an expression of the Catholic faith, which touches on many aspects of life. Writings by Popes and Catholic leaders show how the Catholic faith can guide our response to different issues.

There are 7 principles of Catholic Social Teaching, we are called to uphold them.

- Sharing God's world, protecting the poor How do pupils share at home and at school? What are the kinds of things that are shared? Should everyone get exactly the same? Should some people get more? Why? For example, families with more children might need more resources, or someone with a disability might need extra help.
- Human Dignity 'What makes me special?' 'What makes people special? 'How should we treat each other?'
- **Caring for Creation** How do I show respect for Creation? The earth and all life on it are part of God's creation. We are called to respect this gift. We are responsible for taking care of the world we live in and for sharing all the wonders and resources the earth gives us.
- The Common Good What is 'true community'? The common good is reached when we work together to improve the wellbeing of people in our society and the wider world.
- **Solidarity** Who are our leaders? How do we stand with others? How did Jesus show service and justice?
- Family, community and participation This means all people have the right to participate in society and to seek the common good, which means the good for all.



• **Dignity in work** - All people work in some way because work is more than making a living, it's participating. Therefore, jobs and pay should be fair for everyone.

We will be looking at each of these principals throughout the academic year. The principal we will be focussing on this half term is Caring for Creation.

The earth and all it contains has been created by God. It is a gift, given to all for the good of all. The resources of the earth are not infinite. They have been given to us and to future generations. How we have treated and continue to treat the earth has profound impacts on people now and in the future. Too often we have destroyed elements of the earth for a quick gain. At a General Audience in May 2014, Pope Francis described our destruction of creation as 'like saying to God, 'I don't like it' ... Care for creation is care for God's gift to us, and it means saying to God, 'thank you, I am the custodian of creation, but to enable it to progress, never to destroy your gift''. As stewards, or custodians, of creation we have a special role to play. How we care for the earth is another sign of how we are Christians, how we show God's love in the world and put our love into action.

As well as introducing to the children to the concept of caring for creation, will be looking at what it means to be a 'good steward' and how they could look after our world. It is important that the children understand that the way we treat our common home affects everyone, in every country, now and in the future.

NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g., Nutella) to bring into school.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g., Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g., Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

Parking

Whilst we are delighted to see that Westminster have finally awarded us a keep clear school zone at the front entrance, we note that the parking regime has been updated on the Camden side of the road to include more double yellow lines. Please be aware that we expect enforcement to be vigilant and encourage you to park safely and with consideration for our neighbours in areas where stopping is permitted.

Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g., snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything, they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items.
