Dear Parents,

We have had a lovely week in school. There has, as ever, been so much going on. It was a real pleasure to see our 3–6-year-olds enjoying such a wonderful sports day event out on Primrose Hill this morning – thank you so much for turning out to support your child and making the event what it is. For those of us who were not directly involved in the Junior Sports Day, we were treated to a series of beautiful performances by our musicians in a special music assembly. I would really like to use this opportunity to thank Mrs. Bryant and Mr. Raveney for all the work they do to create such wonderful events, enabling the children in our school to flourish.

As I speak, we are all enjoying the Key Stage 2 Talent Show. The things that your children can do are so very awe-inspiring. We have been treated to solo and group singing, instrumental performances, magic tricks, origami, Irish dancing... so much, in some cases, so unexpected. What a wonderful way to spend the afternoon.

Apart from being a lot of fun, it was a real privilege to see how each child interacted with their peers and how they came to their final design. Mr and Mrs Egg were not quite as enthusiastic about the project, being as they were placed on the top of a tower made only from newspaper and Sellotape – other materials available included a bottle of hand lotion, a playing card, a glue stick, a stapler, a chewed ruler, and a pencil! I was amazed to see a minor tussle over the hand lotion, which was put in as a red herring, but it was all part of the exercise. A lot of fun has been had, and the





children have been very impressive throughout the process. I am looking forward to working with next year's school leaders, albeit for only one term.

I do hope that you all have a relaxing weekend, and thank you once again, for bringing your family to be a part of our community. It is so lovely to have you all, and such a pleasure and privilege to be part of your child's life journey.



# **Mathematics Competitions at Saint Christina's:**

This week, some of the class attempted the Junior Mathematics Kangaroo competition. Although we did not qualify for this competition officially, three of us braved it anyway and enjoyed solving a wide range of mathematics problems. Our top score was equivalent to 84%, and we shall soon know if that score qualified for a merit award.

'It was a lot easier than I had thought – at the end the problems got harder. But it was great fun to do,' was the general reaction.

Two of the problems from the competition were as follows:

- 1. Sophie and Armaan are playing a game. The winner of each game gets 3 points, and the loser gets 1 point. Armaan wins 6 games, and Sophie has a total of 18 points. How many games do they play?
- 2. Four points lie on a straight line. The distances between pairs of points are, in increasing order, 2, 3, k, 11, 12, and 14. What is the value of k?

Once the boundaries for awards are published, we shall let you know how we have done!

NB: Children in Years Two, Three, and Four have been participating in the First Mathematics Challenge this week. Once all the results have come in, you will read about them in next week's bulletin.

## **REMINDERS / HEALTH & SAFETY**

### **NUT FREE SCHOOL**

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g., Nutella) to bring into school.

#### **MEDICATION IN SCHOOL**

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g., Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g. Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

#### Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

#### Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g., snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything, they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.
