Dear Parents,

We have had a delightful week in School. The Autumn Term is not one that winds down to its conclusion. Quite the opposite! This is the one that really ramps up and that is what we are seeing at the moment. So, I have really enjoyed seeing some of the first entries into the various Christmas card competitions that run at this time of year, and have been blown away by some amazing singing as the children start prepping for the Carol Service. The joy and the texture that Year 3 put into their singing with Mrs Bryant this morning, for example, was really impressive. However, to have her affirm the quality of the work that has been done and to speak about the regard with which our community is held, in the local area, was deeply edifying and affirming. I do hope that Magus Education / NW8 mums and dads will continue to work closely with our community in the future.

I wanted to use this bulletin to inform you that the Governors met this week, following a considerable amount of work and due diligence since the Chancellor's financial statement on 30th October, to confirm how they will respond to the changing operating climate that independent schools find themselves in, from 1st January 2025. A separate letter, detailing that decision will be sent to parents. Governors are aware that this is a very testing time for everyone. They want Saint Christina's, our values and the manner in which we pursue them to be as strong as they can be. They want the School you chose to remain the school you chose and not be seminally changed by external decision-makers. They want to ensure we are able to keep a great team of teachers and the wonderful space that your children have to grow within and they are absolutely clear that they do not want to lose any of the families who come together to form our broader community. It therefore follows that we would encourage, once you have seen the letter, any of you who are worried about fees or who will struggle with fees at this time, to contact Joanne Reilly by email at bursar@saintchristinas.org.uk if you have not already done so, in order to see how we might be able to support you and would ask you to do this by 10th December.

Design and Technology

Year 1 have been getting creative in Design and Technology this term! As part of our Explore project, we have been testing different methods to make moving parts. We experimented with various techniques and materials, learning how to create movement in our designs. Using what we discovered, we designed and made our own paper puppets with moving arms and legs, cleverly assembled with split pins. The children showed great imagination and problem-solving skills, and it was wonderful to see their creations come to life!

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Year 2

We have had a brilliant week in Year 2!

In English, we focused on non-fiction texts, particularly learning how to write clear and thoughtful letters. The highlight of the week was when the children wrote their own letters to Father Christmas. They were full of excitement and imagination as they practised writing for a real purpose, carefully thinking about their layout and language.

In Maths, we tackled the topic of fractions, learning how to find halves and quarters of shapes and amounts. The children worked hard to understand the concept of dividing things equally and used a range of practical methods to support their learning.



To spark intellectual curiosity, we used skittles left over from our Maths lesson and placed them on a plate and filled it with water, watching in amazement as the colours formed beautiful patterns. This led to discussions about why the colours spread and what might happen if we used different shapes or amounts of water.

In Religious Education, we explored the concept of Heaven. The children used their imaginations to describe what Heaven might be like and shared their ideas in thoughtful discussions. We also looked at different artistic interpretations of Heaven and reflected on each one.

Meanwhile, our Nativity preparations have continued brilliantly. The children are busy practising their songs and lines, showing real enthusiasm and determination to make the performance something special. They are already looking forward to sharing it with parents in December.

Year 4

Year 4 enjoyed getting stuck into our Design and Technology project this term, creating our own canopic jars inspired by our studies of Ancient Egypt! We used paper cups to make the base of our jars, measuring and cutting carefully to create a lid and base for our jar. We made sure we had the right shape for the heads which would go on the lids of our jars, including adding ears and noses where needed, then covered our jars in mod roc bandages (the same one's doctors use to make casts for our arms!) to make them look like clay. Year 6

It's been another busy and focused week for Year 6 as preparations for exams continue and exams are now in full swing. We are thinking of all the children and wishing them the best of luck over the next few weeks. The children in St. Joan of Arc and St. Francis had the opportunity to lead collective worship for their Houses, sharing reflections and prayers with their peers while St Cecelia practised for their House Mass. In addition to their academic work, the children have started preparing for their upcoming interviews, reviewing past questions and strategising their responses. Mock interviews are scheduled for next week, providing valuable practice as they take the next steps in their journey.

In our Critical Thinking lesson this week Sophie and Apolline delivered their Current Affairs presentations to the class. Sophie talked about how in Australia they have recently decided to ban children who are under sixteen from using social media. One girls' school in Sydney has been trialling gifting children a phone with limited ageappropriate features with access to different features changing each year and then once the child in Year 10 and above the families can take over managing the features. They say that the trial is going well. I wonder if we will have something similar put in place here.

Apolline gave her presentation about the recent opening of the Grand Egyptian Museum. The museum consists of 100,000 artefacts and it is the largest archaeological complex in the world.

Alice chose the topic 'should it be illegal for children to be left at home alone under the age of 12?' She gave a detailed balanced argument which sparked great discussion in the class afterwards.

Catholic Social Teaching at Saint Christina's

Catholic Social Teaching is an expression of the Catholic faith, which touches on many aspects of life. Writings by Popes and Catholic leaders show how the Catholic faith can guide our response to different issues.

There are 7 principles of Catholic Social Teaching, we are called to uphold them.

- Preferential Option for the Poor The option for the poor reminds us of God's preferential love for the
 poorest and most vulnerable people. God's love is universal; he does not side with oppressors, but loves the
 humble.
- Human Dignity 'What makes me special?' 'What makes people special? 'How should we treat each other?'
- Caring for Creation How do I show respect for Creation? The earth and all life on it are part of God's creation. We are called to respect this gift. We are responsible for taking care of the world we live in and for sharing all the wonders and resources the earth gives us.
- The Common Good What is 'true community'? The common good is reached when we work together to improve the wellbeing of people in our society and the wider world.
- Solidarity Who are our leaders? How do we stand with others? How did Jesus show service and justice?
- Family, community and participation This means all
 people have the right to participate in society and to seek
 the common good, which means the good for all.



Dignity in work - All people work in some way because work is more than making a living, it's participating.
 Therefore, jobs and pay should be fair for everyone.

We will be looking at each of these principals throughout the academic year. The principal we will be focussing on this half term is Preferential Option for the Poor.

The Church holds that we should all have a special focus on supporting, walking alongside, and sharing with people who are living in poverty. Pope Francis's much quoted phrase about wanting 'a poor church for the poor' holds the Catholic social teaching principle of the preferential option for the poor at its heart. Although it includes the charitable support of the Church, both the institution and individual members, for those living in poverty locally and globally, it is also wider than this. The option for the poor includes talking with, and listening to, those who are living in poverty. It is not just thinking that we know what people want or need, but listening to people, sharing in their suffering, being the 'voice for the voiceless' when it is not being heard, whilst enabling the voice, the experience, the needs of people to be heard by others in our communities, society, and the world.

NOTICES and REMINDERS

PARENT PARKING AT PICK-UP and DROP-OFF: The School has received a number of complaints from residents about their driveways and gates being blocked by members of our community. In our mind we might think that we will only be a few minutes, but the reality is, residents should be able to expect access to and from their properties whenever they need it. In one instance, someone who has had medical need has been delayed by a car that has been parked inconsiderately.

Please be aware that enforcement on the Terrace is increasingly vigilant and please park safely and with consideration for our neighbours within areas where stopping is permitted.

NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g., Nutella) to bring into school.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g., Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g., Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

Late collection of children

Please be aware that if you enrol one child into a club and need to put another in Homework club, there is a charge of £15 for the session. This is necessary to cover the costs of staffing the provision. Additionally, children who are

collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 is charged if children are collected after 5.00pm which is when the school officially closes for the end of the day.

Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g., snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything, they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.
