Dear Parents,

This week, the children have continued to work really hard, and I have been pleased to see some of the things that they have been achieving.

One aspect of the school that you as parents may not see so easily is our 'spotted' programme. It's something that I was keen to set up when I first came to SCS and which has really taken a hold amongst the children. It's very simple: if a child is spotted doing something that is worthy of recognition or note, then any member of staff can write a citation onto a coloured spot, that is then read out in assembly and displayed within the School. I mention this, because I have been very impressed with the number of spots that I have been able to read out this term – and especially pleased that there has been a very strong recognition of good work rate and kindness. The children will not know that they have been spotted, often, so hearing their citation often brings a broad smile in assembly.

Within assembly, and as part of our emphasis on the world around us, we have been considering the idea of stewardship. We have been asking the question, "How can we be good stewards of the world where we live?" You may know that at the same time the emphasis this year through Laudato Si, is water and that we have also been considering how fortunate we are to have clean water on tap in our homes. You may know that I have challenged every class to see if they can think of a way to raise £60 (from the whole class) so that we can support Tearfund's Toilet twinning Programme. The vision is that we might pair every toilet in the School with a toilet elsewhere in the world. But we wanted to encourage the children to earn the funds and do something to achieve the funds so that they can learn that this is actaully the way the world works. I am conscious that Year 4 are well down the road with a superb helping around the home initiative, and that there are plans from other classes to do a number of different things, but the aim is to encouarge the children to not just raid the bank of Mum and Dad, but maybe get friends or other relatives to sponsor them.

On the theme of looking after the world where we are, can I thank you for your ongoing support for Fr Terry's Foodbank. This is an opportunity for the children to understand that poverty is always with us and that any single donation we make is not a magic wand that solves the problem. Thank you!

During the week I have had the pleasure of being invited to More House, over in Knightsbridge, and Mulberry House which is an age 2-7 setting over in Kilburn. Both visits were very informative and I am pleased that I have been able to add to the very positive links that we have with the Heads there.

I do hope that you enjoy reading through this bulletin and that you have a relaxing weekend.




Headteacher's Rubik Cube Challenge

The challenge is back! I am encouraging the children to pick up the Cube and have a crack at learning how to solve it. This is mainly aimed at Key Stage 2 but it would be wonderful to see Key stage 1 having a crack if they feel like it! There is a very nice handmade badge that is awarded to those who manage to complete it in under a minute that can be worn on their blazer.

Why the Rubik Cube? The Rubik Cube is a really good bit of mental gym. It helps with focus, algorithmic thinking and, helps develop better spatial understanding – being able to see an object in our mind's eye and mentally manipulate it to understand how things work and fit together. Engineers and architects are examples of people who tend to have high levels of spatial thinking ability. In addition, the Cube has been touted by research as actually surpassing Chess in terms of spatial and strategic thinking. So, it's good, and if not just something that should be done for fun, it's incredibly cool to be able to whizz the cube in front of your friends and family ... and if this is still not enough, it's really helpful for children preparing for the 11+! So the challenge is there. I am asking the office to attach the Cube solution as a PDF with the bulletin this week. The version I have is accessible to most of the older children and would certainly be accessible if a member of the household took up the challenge with them. Some great techniques were developed by parents last year in helping children develop systems – and to see that the creation of systems is a good thing to aid learning - around remembering sequences etc. Game On!


Year 2 English




Year 4 and Year 1 Buddies - Care for Creation

Current Affairs in Year 5

In preparation for their 11+ the children in Year 5 have a Current Affairs session every week. It is important for children to become aware of some of the events happening in the world around them, for their own learning and development as citizens in our society. In our weekly sessions, the children learn about the world around them and this can help them to form their own opinions and ideas. They can present their chosen news story of that week in whatever format they choose. I am always very impressed by the confidence and presentation skills which the children develop throughout the year.

Curiosity Club

Some of the children in Year 5 enjoyed the first curiosity club of the year. This week the children had the opportunity to try a variety of different logic and problem-solving puzzles. Some of the chosen puzzles included '30 Cubed which is based on mathematical principles. The set contains 30 different cubes and each cube features the same six base colours. The order of these colours varies from cube to cube. Every side on every cube features part of a "line". The lines appear in ten different colours. The puzzles all require the lines and/or base colours to be connected in different ways, following increasingly complex rules

Another chosen activity was the classic game of 'Mastermind'. This is a deduction game where each player takes turn making a limited number of guesses, using logic to deduce what pegs the opponent has hidden.

'Head Spin' was also chosen which requires quick thinking and fast fingers. Some of the boys chose to build a F1 car using a new construction kit.

All of the puzzles are also very useful in developing different critical thinking and problem-solving skills, useful for the 11+ preparation.

This can be any poem of their choice and they are encouraged to base this poem on the Season of Creation. House Captains will make the children aware of who is to learn what lines of the main house poem and whether they are performing for their year group in the second half of the competition. The competition will take place on Friday 13th October.

The children have been given the poem. Please remind your child to practise their parts for the poem so that they know their lines off by heart.

Buddies – Care of Creation - September 20th and September 27th





Mathematics at Saint Christina's

One of the parts of Mathematics that I find endlessly fascinating is the study of prime numbers. Children learn from early on that there are certain special numbers that can only be divided by one and themselves... We started by revising prime numbers via using the Sieve of Eratosthenes, which helped us to identify the prime numbers under one hundred (QUICK QUESTION: How many prime numbers under 100 are there?), and have since gone on to investigate other properties of primes.

For your own amusement, I shall set you some of the investigations that we are trying in class:

- 1. Can you find pairs of prime numbers that sum to (a) an even number? (b) an odd number? (c) a square number?
- 2. Can you find two square numbers that sum to (a) a prime number? (b) a cubic number?
- 3. Do you notice any patterns in your results?

What have Year 6 been doing this week?

In Geography, we have been studying the map of North America, labelling it with states, settlements, rivers and mountains...It was refreshing to see how well Year Six settled down to doing this work.

In History we have been examining the myth of Theseus and the Minotaur. In addition to remembering the story and reflecting on it (QUICK QUESTION: Just why is it called the Aegean Sea?) we have gone on to examine various sources of information, all of which led to an interesting debate as to how much of the myth really happened, and what is just fiction.

Those are just two of the many activities we have been investigating in Year 6, although some of the class are now beginning to investigate logic puzzles to see how much they can solve!

PE Update

The EYFS classes have continued to enjoy the start to their PE lessons. This week we have enjoyed using the playground for some of their lessons. It has been lovely getting to know the children and playing some games, involving following simple instructions and navigating space safely. We have also spent time on developing their hand eye coordination exploring a variety of pieces of equipment including balls, beanbags, hoops and hurdles, which the children have greatly enjoyed.







In Key Stage 1 this week the children have spent time developing simple generic skills like throwing, catching, jumping, aiming, kicking and rolling through football and netball. The children worked through a carousel of activities and we spent time talking thought the key teaching points.



The Key Stage 2 classes have continued to impress with their efforts and improvements this week. In the football sessions, the children spent time this week working on passing the ball using different parts of their feet and passing over both short and long distances. We then tried to link this to the passing sessions from the previous week before enjoying some small-sided games. In netball, we recapped the key ideas introduced in our passing sessions and spent time looking at ways to get free and lose your maker. All classes also took part in full-sided netball matches with Year 3 and 4 beginning to get a better understanding of the game and the different positions.



It is encouraging to see so many children taking part in the sports after school clubs. It was lovely to see the children working hard during their fencing sessions with Lucy on Wednesday. The football club enjoyed using the new football goals in their session and the larger space has made it possible to play 5 a side matches on our playground which is a huge benefit to the children. In November, we have been able to book in a couple of fixtures during the school day for Year 2 and 3, which will be fantastic.
