Dear Parents,

It has been a delightfully busy week at SCS. As ever the children and the staff have been completely 'on it' and doing the wonderful things that they do, but I think one or two of them will look forward to a slightly later start on Saturday morning this weekend!

Highlights of the week include some very successful sports fixtures where our footballers garnished themselves with some great success on the pitch. We have also hosted a very successful MacMillan's Coffee Morning in the Arts Hall despite every attempt by the weather to put people off!

On a personal note, I have continued to visit and meet with Heads of Senior Schools as we head into the 11+ season. So far this term I have been able to get out to City, Mill Hill and Belmont, and Francis Holland, but have also met colleagues at various Head events. It is always very nice to hear such positive things about our leavers, many of whom are tasked to give me a tour of their new school, which of course means that we are able to get their take on where they are as opposed to just listening to the Head.

It remains a busy time across the sector with the impending changes that the Government have been speaking about, and it's at times like this that all those friendships and connections that we build up in our professional lives come into their own. I can say that we have some wonderful advocates for our sector both within Headship and within the organisations and associations that support independent schools, who continue to work very hard on our behalf. This week, I also note, that a couple of Labour MPs (York and Norwich) have broken ranks with Government messaging to express their concerns with current policy. Whilst I am confident that healthy messaging and pressure continues to be placed on the Government on this matter, my own instinct is that I don't think they are listening. I think they are determined to do what they say they want to do and that they may be inclined to do it even though HMRC and the Treasury will not be ready and are prepared to accept that the roll-out may be a disaster. That said, some of those involved directly hold onto some hope that a few concessions may still be made (e.g. consider a slightly delayed start, consider a few exemptions re SEND, military families etc) but we won't know until the statement at the end of October.

It is easy to feel a little disappointed with the current state of things: it's never nice to feel as if you are being singled out and deprecated despite your very best endeavours. But we musn't own this. As parents and professionals, I know that we will continue to believe in our children and their future. I have worked in six schools during my career, and two as the Head and it will be Saint Christina's that I will remember most fondly. The outstanding professionals and the amazing, adaptable and responsive growth mindset that they have and pass on to the children they teach is just one of the things that makes working in our community so fulfilling. And your children thrive. It is written across every happy face that comes in and leaves school. It's seen on every page of every exercise book and in every conversation and interaction. It's seen in the people that they become, the secondary school success that they achieve and the kindness and love that they are will pass on to their own children in due course ... and we see that when our alumni come back on behalf of their own children.

We are looking forward to next week's coffee morning, which is for our Reception familes. This is a chance for Reception parents to catch up on some of the things that the children have been doing – and don't forget that Reception parents have parent / teacher meetings in the week before Half Term too.

Just a reminder that all parents are welcome to come to Mass on Friday afternoons. It really is a lovely thing to experience, whatever your tradition, and will set you up nicely for the weekend.

Thank you once again, for all your support and kind words over the past week. It really is a privilege to lead such a wonderful community.

Fire Safety Workshop

On Tuesday 24th September Year 2 and Year 5 were delighted to be joined by Rouchelle from the London Fire Brigade who delivered wonderful workshops to both classes.



In Year 2, we learned that fire is dangerous, and can hurt people. We learned about common fire hazards, and to never play with matches and lighters. We also talked about smoke

alarms and how they keep homes safe from fire, what to do in an emergency if there is a fire, and how to call 999.



In Year 5, Rouchelle explained that fire kills, destroys homes and spreads quickly. She educated us that smoke can be as dangerous as fire, how smoke alarms work, and how to make sure they are working properly. We also talked about how to make fire escape plans from homes (including tower blocks), what to do if there is a fire, and how to call 999.

It was an interesting and informative time with Rouchelle and we thank her for her time with us.

PE Update

It has been a very busy week of sport with three football fixtures against Trevor Roberts, Kerem and The Gower School. The children have represented the school so well and played some fantastic football during these games. On Monday, we played three matches against Trevor Roberts with two strong victories and one defeat.

In the first match, the children played fantastically as a team winning 4-0 with some great passing and moving and excellent goals from Harry and Alexander. Alex was awarded star player for some brilliant awareness and excellent passes to assist several goals.

The second match was much tougher with a very strong opposition the children did not give up and kept trying right until the end but struggled to defend resulting in a 5-0 loss. Milana was awarded star player for stopping several attacks. In the final game Star player, Harry continued his great scoring afternoon with another 2 goals in an encouraging 2-0 victory with some good defending.

Music Update

Choirs – there are still a few spaces in KS2 Choir and Little Voices for this term. Next week will be the last week for children to start this term, so if they would like to take part in the choir Christmas performances, please discuss it with them before signing them up on SchoolBase.



All children will be involved in singing as part of the nativity performance (KS1) and carol service (KS2), but the choirs will have additional performance opportunities.

Bare Feet!

All children's Music lessons up to and including year 3 are now taking place with the children in bare feet. This is due to an approach based on the work of Dalcroze and other music practitioners, where the body is our main musical instrument and the floor is a second. Working in bare feet allows optimal balance, grace and sensitivity, and enables the children to engage their whole bodies in the embodiment of musical concepts, with the feet an essential part of the approach; as children are learning to sing and move musically through space, their contact with the ground needs to be nuanced in a way that wearing shoes does not allow. It is a beautiful and holistic approach which, as well as helping to develop an instinctive sense of musicality, can help children to improve their overall coordination and balance.

Our Music classroom is lovely and warm throughout the year and the floor is always kept clean. Girls wearing tights have so far been able to change without much difficulty, but please avoid tights under PE trousers or shorts as this causes problems. Younger children especially EYFS will be supported in changing in and out of their shoes, but any practice they can do at home is very helpful.

It has been a lovely start to the term and great to see children singing so enthusiastically in assembly, Mass, choirs and in lessons.

We believe, at Saint Christina's, that we are called to serve those around us throughout the year.


We were so touched by your generosity towards Fr Terry's Food Bank last year and we are continuing to collect non-perishable food this half term.

REMINDERS

Please ensure that children are wearing their winter uniform from Monday 30th September.

NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g., Nutella) to bring into school.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g., Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g., Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

Parking

Whilst we are delighted to see that Westminster have finally awarded us a keep clear school zone at the front entrance, we note that the parking regime has been updated on the Camden side of the road to include more double yellow lines. Please be aware that we expect enforcement to be vigilant and encourage you to park safely and with consideration for our neighbours in areas where stopping is permitted.

Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g., snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything, they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.

Sunday Mass

Just a reminder to everyone, you are all invited to join Sunday Mass, which is held in the Chapel at 10.00am

Safety around drop-off

A polite reminder – if you are dropping your child off for breakfast club or a morning music lesson, **your child must** be supervised until the doors open at 8.00am and under no circumstances left unattended.

Safety around retrieving forgotten items

For health & safety reasons, children should not return to school to retrieve forgotten items e.g. homework, snack boxes, coats etc. Once school has finished, the teachers either use their classroom for meetings or the classrooms may be empty with no one there to supervise your child whilst they are on the premises. Any belongings left in classrooms can be collected the next day during regular school hours.

Chicken Pox

There has been a confirmed case of chicken pox in the Year 1 Class. Therefore, we would like to take this opportunity to remind you of the procedure for when to keep your child at home and when it is appropriate to send them back to school, should your child develop the symptoms.

Chicken pox is a mild and common childhood illness caused by a virus called varicella zoster. It is most common in children under the age of 10 and is contagious. The person is contagious from 1 to 2 days before the spots appear until the spots have crusted over (usually 5-6 days after the spots appear). Groups of people that are most at risk of serious problems if they catch chicken pox are new born babies, pregnant women and those with a weakened immune system. Therefore, it is important, if your child has chicken pox, to keep them at home while they are contagious. If we suspect a child has chicken pox at school, parents will be contacted and asked to collect them. All children should remain at home until all chicken pox spots have crusted over to avoid further spread of the illness.
