Dear Parents,

So many things going on! This week has been incredibly busy with all the various practices and rehearsals that the staff and children are involved in for Nativities and Carols. On top of this, and all the routine things that we do, some of the older children have still found the time to sing carols outside St John's Wood Tube Station to support the Hospice - a lovely example of living our Golden Thread of Loving our Neighbour, in the community.

You will notice that there are a number of initiatives from the Charity Prefects and Caritas Ambassadors, such as Christmas Jumper Day and the Boxes of Love, so do please support these if you are able to do so. One of the best parts of being the Headteacher in this School is the heart that the children have for others. Please also do not forget that we are continually collecting food for Fr Terry's foodbank, so if you would like to contribute any dry or tinned food at any point, you are most welcome to do so.

Year 3 had the opportunity to go out to St Alban's this week to visit the Roman Museum whilst Year 5 headed out to the Ragged Museum where they had the opportunity to experience what it was like to live as a child in Victorian England – I think that the universal view was that they prefer Saint Christina's to the Victorian Education system! Next week sees even more trips, with Reception and Key Stage 1 heading out on different occasions. As I noted last week, the Autumn Term is not one that fizzles out! It only gets busier but, whilst busy, it is also a joyful time and lovely to see all the ways in which the children are growing in every sense.

I have been very impressed with the entries for my Challenge about elephants and planes. All the entries have been well researched and presented, and it has been really exciting to see how well these very young minds can explain the concepts of lift and thrust etc., in a way that shows that they understand and don't just know about why planes can fly.

My next challenge is a two-weeker! It's not new, but it is a new push. I have challenged children in Year 2 through to Year 6 to see if they can master the Cube before the end of term. All they need is a cube, so I hope that there might be one lying around at home – if not, they are not expensive and could be an early stocking filler? (Choose one that is easy to manipulate and not stiff). I am providing the solution as a separate attachment to this bulletin, so all they need to do is to copy and memorise the phases. Two weeks is a tight deadline, but it's very possible – many have cracked the cube when they have applied themselves, in under a week. The challenge is laid out so that everyone can succeed because there are different levels of mastery – being able to complete one side, or one side and the bottom two ranks of the next phase etc., however, if we have any that crack the whole thing and complete it at speed, there is a handmade Cube Master badge waiting to adorn their blazer. I would love to able to see what the children can do before I leave at the end of term.

Year 2



Below are some examples of the symbols we created.





Year 5 History Trip to a Ragged School: A Glimpse into Victorian Life

An update on the 25th Annual Primary Mathematics Challenge

Two weeks ago, you received news that 49 of our children had participated in the Primary Mathematics Challenge. Now that the competition is over, we are eagerly awaiting results, and anticipating that at least some of our children will go through to the Bonus Round in January/February 2025. We will not know for sure how many children will be invited, but having spoken to colleagues in another school it is more than likely that some of our children will be invited; however, as the cut off score for invitations varies from year to year, we cannot be entirely sure about just how many children will go through to the next round.

Of our 49 participants, six children were awarded Gold certificates this year. They, and all of the other participants had to answer a range of questions including the following two examples:

Qu 2: My dog Crunch has lived for 104 weeks. How old is he?

Qu 21: Errol and Lauren keep bees. In Errol's hive there are 45,000 bees, to the nearest thousand bees. In Lauren's hive there are 56,000 bees, to the nearest thousand bees. To the nearest thousand, what is the greatest possible difference in the number of bees in the two hives?

Catholic Social Teaching at Saint Christina's

Catholic Social Teaching is an expression of the Catholic faith, which touches on many aspects of life. Writings by Popes and Catholic leaders show how the Catholic faith can guide our response to different issues.

There are 7 principles of Catholic Social Teaching, we are called to uphold them.

- Preferential Option for the Poor The option for the poor reminds us of God's preferential love for the
 poorest and most vulnerable people. God's love is universal; he does not side with oppressors, but loves the
 humble.
- Human Dignity 'What makes me special?' 'What makes people special? 'How should we treat each other?'
- Caring for Creation How do I show respect for Creation? The earth and all life on it are part of God's
 creation. We are called to respect this gift. We are responsible for taking care of the world we live in and for
 sharing all the wonders and resources the earth gives us.
- The Common Good What is 'true community'? The common good is reached when we work together to improve the wellbeing of people in our society and the wider world.
- **Solidarity** Who are our leaders? How do we stand with others? How did Jesus show service and justice?
- Family, community and participation This means all people have the right to participate in society and to seek the common good, which means the good for all.



Dignity in work - All people work in some way because work is more than making a living, it's participating.
 Therefore, jobs and pay should be fair for everyone.

We will be looking at each of these principals throughout the academic year. The principal we will be focussing on this half term is Preferential Option for the Poor.

The Church holds that we should all have a special focus on supporting, walking alongside, and sharing with people who are living in poverty. Pope Francis's much quoted phrase about wanting 'a poor church for the poor' holds the Catholic social teaching principle of the preferential option for the poor at its heart. Although it includes the charitable support of the Church, both the institution and individual members, for those living in poverty locally and globally, it is also wider than this. The option for the poor includes talking with, and listening to, those who are living in poverty. It is not just thinking that we know what people want or need, but listening to people, sharing in their suffering, being the 'voice for the voiceless' when it is not being heard, whilst enabling the voice, the experience, the needs of people to be heard by others in our communities, society, and the world.


Boxes of Love Collection

NOTICES and REMINDERS

PARENT PARKING AT PICK-UP and DROP-OFF: The School has received a number of complaints from residents about their driveways and gates being blocked by members of our community. In our mind we might think that we will only be a few minutes, but the reality is, residents should be able to expect access to and from their properties whenever they need it. In one instance, someone who has had medical need has been delayed by a car that has been parked inconsiderately.

Please be aware that enforcement on the Terrace is increasingly vigilant and please park safely and with consideration for our neighbours within areas where stopping is permitted.

NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g., Nutella) to bring into school.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g., Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g., Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

Late collection of children

Please be aware that if you enrol one child into a club and need to put another in Homework club, there is a charge of £15 for the session. This is necessary to cover the costs of staffing the provision. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 is charged if children are collected after 5.00pm which is when the school officially closes for the end of the day.

Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g., snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything, they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.
