



## **Mathematics in Year 6**

This week Year 6 have been paying attention to fractions and the problem-solving situations that can arise from fractions.

They have used a range of different problem-solving skills: using logical procedures for decision making, interpreting pie charts, looking for symmetry, applying what they know to a problem where it seems that there is 'no way in', finding patterns in seemingly random results as well as interpreting complex instructions.

In addition, they have practised using various different aspects of fractions: equivalency of fractions, converting fractions to decimals and vice-versa, comparing sizes of different fractions and mixed numbers, adding and subtracting fractions as well as dividing them.

Part of their work will go on display upstairs, as many of them chose to complete quilts where they had to colour in shapes according to various different calculations using fractions.

I will leave you with the investigation that many of them tried out on Wednesday, which comes from the NRICH site:

There's a room in your school that has three tables in it with plenty of space for chairs to go round. Table 1 has one block of chocolate on it, table 2 has two blocks of chocolate on it and, guess what, table 3 has three blocks of chocolate on it.

Now ... outside the room is a class of children. Thirty of them all lined up ready to go in and eat the chocolate. These children are allowed to come in one at a time and can enter when the person in front of them has sat down. When a child enters the room, they ask themself this question:

### "If the chocolate on the table I sit at is to be shared out equally when I sit down, which would be the best table to sit at?"

It is fairly easy for the first few children to decide where to sit, but the question gets harder to answer as the number of children entering the room increases.

Most members of the class solved the problem for 16 pupils (the number of children in Year 6), and some went further to solve the problem for greater numbers of children. A few children even went as far as noticing the patterns that cropped up in their findings and commenting on what they saw.

NOW: Can you solve this problem (with your children, if you like) and present the results in a convincing way?

Year 6 did!

I am indebted to Mrs Ellisdon for allowing me to try out this problem with Year 6. They certainly got a lot out of it.

The Challenge will begin after October half term, the week beginning 4<sup>th</sup> November during Computing lessons.

Please go to <u>www.bebras.uk</u> and click past *Challenges*, select your age group and try out some questions. You will be told straight away whether you are correct and an explanation is given.

#### Learn about computational thinking skills with BBC bitesize

The BBC have produced some excellent resources for pupils wishing to learn about computational thinking.

This challenge is for parents!

Troy has a collection of gems.

He ranks his gems from his overall favourite to his least favourite.

Sarah knows which gems are in Troy's collection, but she does not know how he has ranked them.

Sarah has a plan to find out which gem is Troy's overall favourite:

- Sarah chooses four of Troy's gems and asks Troy: "Out of this group of four, which gem is your favourite?"
- Sarah chooses a new set of four gems and asks her question again.
- Then she chooses a third set of four gems and asks her question for the last time.



<u>Note</u>: When Sarah chooses her second and third set of four gems, she may sometimes include gems she has chosen before.

#### Question:

If Sarah is to successfully find Troy's overall favourite gem, what is the largest possible number of gems in Troy's collection?

8 10 11 or 12

## **PE Update**

It has been another exciting week of PE at Saint Christina's, with lots of progress being made across the school.

Our youngest learners in Nursery and Reception have been really enjoying their PE lessons. The focus has been on listening and responding to instructions through a variety of chasing and running games. These activities have helped them develop key skills like jumping, running and negotiating space safely. Year 1, have been working on their coordination and teamwork skills through football and netball-based games. The children have been exploring ball-handling techniques and while practising aiming at nearby targets.



Next week Year 5 and 6 have their Inter House netball competition next Wednesday which should be an excellent afternoon of netball. The Key Stage 2 classes have spent time this week working on their positioning and understanding of the game in netball and are starting to get the hang of some of the tactics. In football we have focussed on shooting and creating space.

Year 3 and 4 enjoyed their first football match of the year against Trevor Roberts on Monday. The children put in an excellent effort against 3 very strong teams and were well beaten but did not give up throughout the games. Well done to the star players from the games who were Oliver and Sadra who both made several fantastic saves in goal and Isabella made lots of fantastic tackles and blocks in defence.



On Wednesday the Year 5 and 6 netball team took part in an afternoon tournament hosted by London Collegiate School. The standard of netball was extremely high and our children put in a fantastic effort throughout the afternoon. They took a little time to adapt to the 5 a side netball rules but made some excellent performances in the later part of the competition drawing and winning their final 4 matches. Well, done to Alice M who was awarded the star player form the team.



Next week Year 5 begin their intensive 2-week swimming course at Swiss Cottage Leisure centre. The sessions are designed to develop the children's all round swimming technique across all of the strokes as well as learning some important water safety skills.

## REMINDERS

#### NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g., Nutella) to bring into school.

#### **MEDICATION IN SCHOOL**

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g., Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g., Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

#### Late collection of children

Please be aware that if you enrol one child into a club and need to put another in Homework club, there is a charge of £15 for the session. This is necessary to cover the costs of staffing the provision. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 is charged if children are collected after 5.00pm which is when the school officially closes for the end of the day.

#### Parking

Whilst we are delighted to see that Westminster have finally awarded us a keep clear school zone at the front entrance, we note that the parking regime has been updated on the Camden side of the road to include more double yellow lines. Please be aware that we expect enforcement to be vigilant and encourage you to park safely and with consideration for our neighbours in areas where stopping is permitted.

#### Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g., snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything, they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.

#### Sunday Mass

Just a reminder to everyone, you are all invited to join Sunday Mass, which is held in the Chapel at 10.00am

#### Safety around drop-off

A polite reminder – if you are dropping your child off for breakfast club or a morning music lesson, **your child must be supervised until the doors open at 8.00am and under no circumstances left unattended**.

#### **Retrieving forgotten items**

For practical and safety reasons it is not always possible for children to return to school to retrieve forgotten items e.g. homework, snack boxes, coats etc. Once school has finished, the teachers either use their classroom for meetings or the classrooms may be empty with no one there to supervise your child whilst they are on the premises. It is rare that any oversight will be seminal and that there will be drastic repercussions should anything be temporarily irretrievable. Any belongings left in classrooms can be collected the next day during regular school hours.
