Dear Parents,

I am delighted to be writing to you at the end of a busy start to the new school year. It has been a real privilege to spend time in every class and see energy, purpose and buzz as we all move back into our routines and get to grips with our new curriculum. Thank you for the generous comments that you have made about the start of term arrangements and the meetings that you enjoyed with your child's teacher. I am pleased too, to note that the nearly new uniform sale was well-received and I would like to take this opportunity to thank our wonderful Parent Link team who organised the event.

We extend a special welcome to all the families who are joining us for their first term. We hope that you will quickly settle into our school family. We also extend a warm welcome Ms Farquhar, our new Year 4 teacher, Mrs. Retesi and Ms Tiniaieva, our new Reception Teaching Assistants, and Mrs. Hills, our new Y6 Teaching Assistant. All of our new staff come to us with considerable depth of experience and have already made a wonderful impact on the school and the children. Mrs Bretones' role has also slightly changed as she expands her role following maternity leave – she will now teach our Spanish curriculum as well as maintaining some of her Art teaching. We wish all of the new members of our community every blessing as you begin this new phase in your lives.

I would like to thank all of our parent body for your support for us as we set out this term. Drop-off and pick-up is always very busy in the first week of the new year as we all work out exactly how everything functions, however, it is only day three and I can already see the children bouncing in and heading in the right direction without too much guidance required. Clubs will start next week, which will mean that there will be a little more space at the end of the day in particular, but I would ask all parents to be mindful that as we release the children it is really important that they have clear access on the pavement and that parents or carers are clearly visible to us as we release them. Once collected, we would be grateful if you would quickly move away and free up the space around the gate.

Today we enjoyed our first whole school assembly. Our theme today and over the next few weeks will be around relationships, and how we can make the world a better place through the way we think about and treat others. This is all part of our Golden Thread, that we love our neighbours. Over the next few weeks we will be thinking about our core values of love, joy, peace, goodness, kindness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control and who we would like to be.

Those of you who have been at Saint Christina's for some time, will know that we have tried to keep a gentle flow of information around the possible implementation of VAT on independent school fees. Since taking office, the Chancellor, Rachel Reeves has stated that it is the intention of the government to follow through on this campaign pledge and implement the policy as early as January 2025. This is obviously not what we all would have liked to hear but it is the reality, although a careful scrutiny of the media will show you that there is an increasingly vocal critique of the policy, and not just from our sector. You might have noticed that a number of state school heads have already spoken out against the impact that they perceive the policy will have on their schools, for example.

The reality is that we will not know exactly what the government intends to do or whether there will be any nuance to the application of the levy. I am aware that the ISC, for example, has been lobbying for smaller schools and for those of us who have a faith element. We will have to see if that has any impact, but my instinct is that the government seems to be being quite hard-nosed about the policy and that schools will be forced how best to accommodate this unwelcome guest. What I can say, regarding Saint Christina's is, that our governing body is kind and mindful of the need to ensure that our community continues to flourish as a wonderful, safe and happy place for children to grow and learn, and this will inform the decisions that they make when we know the full details after the Chancellor's announcement on 30th October.

Despite the joy that you will have had that term has restarted, I am sure that you will all be looking forward to the weekend. It will give everyone the opportunity to just take a breath and recalibrate as we look forward to our first full week back in school next week.


Year 5 Tarsia Puzzle

Catholic Social Teaching at Saint Christina's

Catholic Social Teaching is an expression of the Catholic faith, which touches on many aspects of life. Writings by Popes and Catholic leaders show how the Catholic faith can guide our response to different issues.

There are 7 principles of Catholic Social Teaching, we are called to uphold them.

- Sharing God's world, protecting the poor How do pupils share at home and at school? What are the kinds of things that are shared? Should everyone get exactly the same? Should some people get more? Why? For example, families with more children might need more resources, or someone with a disability might need extra help.
- Human Dignity 'What makes me special?' 'What makes people special? 'How should we treat each other?'
- **Caring for Creation** How do I show respect for Creation? The earth and all life on it are part of God's creation. We are called to respect this gift. We are responsible for taking care of the world we live in and for sharing all the wonders and resources the earth gives us.
- The Common Good What is 'true community'? The common good is reached when we work together to improve the wellbeing of people in our society and the wider world.
- **Solidarity** Who are our leaders? How do we stand with others? How did Jesus show service and justice?
- Family, community and participation This means all people have the right to participate in society and to seek the common good, which means the good for all.



• **Dignity in work** - All people work in some way because work is more than making a living, it's participating. Therefore, jobs and pay should be fair for everyone.

We will be looking at each of these principals throughout the academic year. The principal we will be focussing on this half term is Caring for Creation.

The earth and all it contains has been created by God. It is a gift, given to all for the good of all. The resources of the earth are not infinite. They have been given to us and to future generations. How we have treated and continue to treat the earth has profound impacts on people now and in the future. Too often we have destroyed elements of the earth for a quick gain. At a General Audience in May 2014, Pope Francis described our destruction of creation as 'like saying to God, 'I don't like it' ... Care for creation is care for God's gift to us, and it means saying to God, 'thank you, I am the custodian of creation, but to enable it to progress, never to destroy your gift''. As stewards, or custodians, of creation we have a special role to play. How we care for the earth is another sign of how we are Christians, how we show God's love in the world and put our love into action.

As well as introducing to the children to the concept of caring for creation, will be looking at what it means to be a 'good steward' and how they could look after our world. It is important that the children understand that the way we treat our common home affects everyone, in every country, now and in the future.

We will be doing this in memory of Ms Overing's sister, who over the course of her life held many of these events and raised thousands of pounds to support this wonderful charity.

NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g., Nutella) to bring into school.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g., Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g., Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15

for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

Parking

Whilst we are delighted to see that Westminster have finally awarded us a keep clear school zone at the front entrance, we note that the parking regime has been updated on the Camden side of the road to include more double yellow lines. Please be aware that we expect enforcement to be vigilant and encourage you to park safely and with consideration for our neighbours in areas where stopping is permitted.

Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g., snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything, they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items.
