Dear Parents,

It is amazing what a difference just having decent warmer weather makes! We don't need it to be too hot, because then it is hard to focus the children on their learning, but, just to be enjoying warm, bright days is so good for our daily outlook and wellbeing. This said, the school community is so very positive already and I can honestly say I have never worked in a place where the staff and pupils are more aligned and enthusiasic in their learning. There is such a positive outlook on everything that it is a pleasure to lead here. Nothing is impossible!

Which forms a great segue to our Parent Link and the support and encouragement that you as parents as a whole body offer the school on a daily basis. On this note, may I take this opportunity to publicly thank the PL for what you have contributed to our community over this term. Many of us were able to attend a fantastic quiz night just before half term, and I think it speaks well to our broader community that you as parents were prepared to allow the teachers to win. In addition to this, funds have been raised to buy a fantastic new keyboard for the Chapel – it arrived this week and it is amazing. Some of you have also been involved in helping refresh the green wall, and others have even used your professional skills to support our teaching and learning and project planning. May I thank you from the bottom of my heart. We often say that this school is very special, but it really is. I have never worked in a community like it. Thank you.

Within school, so many things have occurred during the week. We have seen the first run-throughs for the summer production this week. Always a challenge to get everyone to make the connections between the bits that they have been rehearsing separately, but everything is already looking very good. The feedback from the residential has been excellent. I am delighted with how well the children behaved and, more importantly, embraced the opportunity to learn and experience the things that they were engaged with. To hear Mrs Ellisdon say that she felt it was the best residential experience that she has had, was really gratifying. On the back of this, I will be spending some time talking about leadership to our current Year 5 pupils as they look to becoming the senior pupils in the School in September. This will happen over the next few weeks.

The decision by the Prime Minister to call an election for July was a little bit of a surprise to most. Nevertheless we have embraced the decision and this morning I have delivered an assembly that explained to all the children what a general election is, what happens during an election campaign and how people vote. I am pleased that we all know (if we were listening) what a poll is now, and am further delighted to tell you that we successfully elected a new president for the US on the platform that everyone will have bubblegum for breakfast! We haven't broken the news to Joe and Donald yet though!

On a more serious note, the polls do suggest that we are likely to see a change in the governing party in July and this may have implications for the independent sector, with regard to the commitment from Labour, to apply VAT to school fees. Most commentators believe that the policy proposal was, initially, what they are terming a 'kite-flying' exercise to gauge public reaction. However, the same commentators acknowledge that in flying the kite, the Labour Party have stimulated quite a strong reaction and thus it will be difficult to not go ahead with their proposal if they do indeed get into office. The problem is that they have not actually said exactly what they will do. Would they levy the tax as is, might they charge at a lower rate or indeed have a graduated scale of charge to reflect the different schools that together make the sector. We just don't know. No school, therefore, is in a position to say exactly what they will do if the policy is implemented but I do know that the governors here will do their best to find a route through that ensures

the school is able to continue to offer the really high quality provision that we are currently able to enjoy whilst considering all stakeholders.

In the meantime, having spoken to a few well-placed legal and tax experts working in this field, and having read the independent report by the Adam Smith Institute (it challenges the IFS assessment upon which Labour is drawing), I think that the implementation of the policy will be complicated and potentially messy. Unless nuance is introduced, any provider of education independently will be caught up in this – football on Sunday anyone? – and just simple statements like, 'we want to protect SEND children from the tax', begs the question of how is this equitably implemented ... do independent special schools receive an exemption or would that apply to any independent school that supports chilren with SEN? It is highly likely that there will also be significant implications for those who send their children to state schools too! Whilst announcing that this policy will be implemented is likely to be an early announcement by a Labour government, it is possible that time may be needed to work through the implications. Thus it is not clear when any charge (still not known) might be levied. Most experts also suggest that if the policy is introduced, the government is likely to face a legal challenge. Broadening the picture slightly the Lib Dems are opposed to Labour's policy. Sir Ed Davey said, "on this specific point, I've never thought in principle that VAT should be applied to education." His party's position will only be pertinent should Lib Dem support be required for government in the new parliament.

I am attaching the Adam Smith Institute's report with this bulletin should you be interested and want a little light bedtime reading!


Here is a picture of us in the caves!



Finally, a big thank you to all the many volunteers, both parents and staff, who gave their free time to sell/make/craft/clean/set up and pack down in order to make it all happen. Saint Christina's gets greener

Now that the bones of the new playground are well in place, our attention is turned to improving some of the finer aspects of the children's outdoor space. The first project has begun with the revitalisation of the existing green wall

at The Avenue end of the playground. A small group of volunteers spent Wednesday afternoon weeding, tilling and refilling the over 600 small pots that make up this space, before planting approximately 50 different seedlings donated by existing parents. The school provided a further 50 seedlings, but that leaves 500 pots that still need filling...so we are launching adopt a pot! A £2 donation will ensure a seedling is purchased, and planted on your behalf by our volunteers, and the pit will be labelled with your child's name so that the children are able to visit and track the progress of their plants as they grow. The next planting bee will be in two weeks, ahead of Summer Fair, so please get those donations in to your Class Rep ASAP.

REMINDERS / HEALTH & SAFETY

NUT FREE SCHOOL

We have a number of pupils and staff in the school who have serious nut allergies. Please will you ensure that you do not give your child any nuts or nut products (e.g. Nutella) to bring into school.

MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

Please do not send your child into school with any medication on their person. Medication can only be administered by qualified personnel. The only medication that we can administer, therefore, is prescribed medication e.g. Antibiotics, Inhalers, EpiPen's. Children should not be sent into school with any other type of medication e.g. Cold and Flu medicines / Calpol / Lozenges etc. If your child is unwell and in need of medication, they should remain at home until they feel better.

If your child does have any medication, please contact Miss Georgia, and she will ask you to fill in the relevant forms and keep the medication safely in the School Office. Thank you for your co-operation.

Late collection of children

If a parent enrols one child into a club and needs to put another in Homework club, they will be charged a fee of £15 for the second child. Additionally, children who are collected late at the end of the school day or after a club will be sent to Homework Club and parents will be charged accordingly. Homework Club runs from Monday to Thursday from 3.30-5.00pm and costs £15 per session. A late fee of £50 will be charged if children are collected after 5.00pm.

Items left in the front office

Please ensure that your child has everything they need for the school day before they arrive in the morning: e.g. snacks / PE Kit. Items are regularly being left in the office by parents and carers throughout the day and, whilst they will do everything they can to help you, this causes disruption not only to the office staff but also to the children, Class Teachers and TAs who have to come to the office to collect the items. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.
